Dean receives honorary degree

Our dean, Judson Klooster, DDS, recently received an outstanding honor from his alma mater, The University of the Pacific. Dr. Klooster was asked to speak for their graduation services. While there, he was presented with an honorary doctor of public service degree by the university president.

Following is a reprint of the award: The University of the Pacific honors Judson Klooster, DDS.

Distinguished alumnus, successful administrator and respected educator, you have brought distinction to your alma mater through the accomplishments of your career and have provided leadership to the dental profession.

After graduating from the University of the Pacific School of Dentistry (then the College of Physicians and Surgeons) in 1947, you successfully practiced dentistry in Northern California for two years before moving to Southern California. You began your career in dental education during an internship and continued as a part-time junior faculty member at UOP.

You began your faculty service at Loma Linda University in 1956 on a part-time basis. Following your post-doctoral education you returned to Loma Linda as a full-time faculty member. In 1969 you were appointed Associate Dean for Academic Administration, and have been Dean of the Loma Linda School of Dentistry since 1971.

In spite of your many administrative duties, you have remained in touch with clinical dentistry and are a member of numerous dental societies. In addition, you currently serve as president of the American Fund for Dental Health and are a member of the Board of Councilors of the International College of Dentists.

I am privileged, by the authority vested in me, and by vote of the faculty and the Board of Regents, to confer upon you the honorary degree, Doctor of Public Service.

Endodontics

Where did the endodontic faculty go? If it looked as if there were only a few endodontists around after mid-June, it was because several faculty members were off to various activities overseas.

• Mahmoud Torabinejad, DDS, director of graduate endodontics, went to London on June 15 to begin a one-month sabbatical at the University of London, where he will be working on a PhD project on dental material biocompatibility.

- Steven Morrow, DDS, left June 19 for Paris, where he attended the Second World Congress on Endodontics. He presented a paper entitled The role of black pigmented bacteroides in endodontic infections.
- · June 19, Leif K. Bakland, DDS, chair of the department, flew to England and Scotland, where he attended meetings of the International Association of Dental Research. The first of two meetings was held in Windermere, England, and was an IADR satellite meeting sponsored by the Pulp Biology and the Neuroscience Groups of the IADR. Following that meeting, it was on to Glasgow, Scotland, for the main IADR meeting. Dr. Bakland completed a year of presidency of the Pulp Biology Group by presiding over the group activities in Windermere and Glasgow.
- Douglas McKendry, DDS, also went to Glasgow for the IADR meeting, and presented a paper entitled Ferret dentition as a model for endodontic research.

International dentistry

Ming-Way Lee, DDS, assistant professor, spoke for several groups in Taiwan during his trip of May 8 to 25. He gave lectures and patient demonstrations on "O" ring coping attachment RPD at Taiwan Adventist Hospital; was guest speaker for the annual meeting of Taiwan Dental Technician Association on Technical procedures for "O" ring coping system (Dr. Lee published an article about the system in the association's journal in 1991.); met with the Taiwan Implant Study Group for the promotion of the international dentist program and continuing education in oral implantology at Loma Linda; and was invited by the General Practitioners Continuing Education Association as guest lecturer on "O" ring coping system.

Oral and maxillofacial surgery

 Philip Boyne, DMD, director of advanced education, participated as a principal lecturer for a continuing education program on May 6 at the 49th Annual Session of the American Association of Endodontists in San Francisco. He presented a seminar on Single Tooth Implants. Two days later, Dr. Boyne presented two research papers at the 2nd UCLA Symposium, held in Palm Springs, on implants in the partially edentulous patient. The papers were entitled BMP-impregnated microporous filters in bone regeneration and Effect of porous bone mineral in increasing bone density and trabecular pattern.

• At the 1992 American Cleft Palate-Craniofacial Association Annual Meeting in Portland, May 12 through 15, Dr. Boyne gave an oral presentation on BMP-impregnated microporous filters in bone regeneration: possible application to cleft palate grafting. Timothy Welch, DDS, presented a paper on implants in midline clefts. Dr. Welch also chaired a scientific session at

the Oregon meeting.

• Dr. Boyne and Mark Womack, DDS, attended the American Association of Plastic Surgeons 71st Annual Meeting in Vancouver, British Columbia, on May 18. A paper by Dr. Boyne entitled A long-term study of free condylar grafts for treatment of condylar fractures was presented by co-author Robert Hardesty, MD.

· On May 20 Dr. Boyne chaired and organized five hours of continuing education at the Tri-County dental Society's Annual Spring Meeting held in Ontario. The program was entitled Diagnostic, Prosthodontic, and Surgical Problems Associated with the Use of Implants. The panel included Dr. Jeffrey Rosenbert of Los Angeles, Dr. Welch, and Jaime Lozada, DDS. clinical director of oral implantology. The program was problem-oriented, addressing the salvaging of implants and solving of prosthodontic problems. Discussions were presented using both intraosseous and subperiosteal implants.

ADA director to retire

CHICAGO—Culminating a 30year career with the American Dental Association, Thomas J. Ginley, PhD, executive director, announced that he will retire effective August 1, 1992.

In his announcement to the ADA staff and Board of Trustees, Dr. Ginley said he had decided to take advantage of an early retirement program that has been offered to Association employees. Approximately 60 employees are eligible to participate in the early retirement program.

"The timing both for me and for the Association seemed appropriate," said 54-year-old Dr. Ginley. "The Association is the strongest it has been financially in over 20 years and is rich in member services. We are wrapping up a strategic planning process that will place the Association in good stead for the future."

A successor to Dr. Ginley will be selected by the ADA Board of Trustees. In the interim, current associate executive director, William E. Allen, DDS, will serve as acting executive director.

Dr. Ginley started working for the ADA in 1963 as director of the council on dental education's division of educational measureIf you always do

ments. He later became secretary of the council on dental education and commission on dental accreditation. In 1978 Dr. Ginley was named assistant executive director of the division of education and hospitals, and was promoted to associate executive director for policy and planning in March, 1979.

In August of 1985 he was named executive director by the board of trustees, and became the first non-dentist to hold that position. As chief executive officer he oversees a staff of nearly 400 employees and an annual budget of \$44.8 million. He is responsible for implementing the policy decisions of the ADA house of delegates, and assists the officers and trustees in guiding the future of the Association.

The American Dental Association is the nation's second largest health care association, with a membership of over 140,000 dentists. The ADA is headquartered in Chicago, with a legislative office in Washington, DC.

Peace Corps recruiting dentists

CHICAGO—The U.S. Peace Corps is recruiting licensed dentists to perform emergency and routine treatment for patients at clinics and camps worldwide, reports the February, 1992, General Dentistry, a publication of the Academy of General Dentistry.

and is currently filling requests from Nepal. Requests for dentists have also come from Jamaica, Haiti, Togo (West Africa), and Malawi (Southeast Africa), said Kimberly A. Rowe, manager of the volunteer program.

The Volunteer Partner Program is a new initiative that offers skilled professionals the opportunity to work for one or two years in agriculture, health, education, or business development.

Volunteer partner dentists, in conjunction with host-country workers, can expect to develop community dental health care and teaching programs. Partners are subject to customary Peace Corps placement, evaluation and medical standards.

"Age is not a barrier to Peace Corps service," says Rowe. "The average volunteer is 31 years, and 10 percent of volunteers are 50 or older."

New handpiece sterilization protocol

A new handpiece sterilization system was recently developed as part of the infection control protocol for the dental clinics:

I. Clean

Wipe handpiece with disinfectant soaked gauze, then use another unused gauze and wipe again. Place the head of the handpiece into a beaker with cleaner, place into one of the ultra sonics provided for this use. Be sure to put the lid onto the unit before setting the timer for one (1) minute. After the sonic cleaning, wipe handpiece dry.

II. Lubricate

Follow the lubrication procedure prescribed in your handpiece instructions. Briefly operate the handpiece until excess is expelled.

III. Sterilize

1) Etch onto the smooth surface of each handpiece shank your box number or department name. Etch no smaller than 1/4 inch; score deeply enough to be easily read.

Request a color code band from the sterilization department. Place the color band on the handpiece shank near the unit connection: #300-399, white; #200-299, yellow; #100-199, black; #000-099, orange; senior hygiene, white/yellow; junior hygiene, black/orange.

- 2) When turning in to sterilization, be sure someone receives your handpiece from you at the window. Do not leave handpiece on the counter or on top of an instrument pan. Please turn in a bag already labeled with your box number along with your handpiece.
- 3) Allow 10 to 15 minutes for processing, then return to sterilization department to collect your bagged handpiece.
- 4) It is recommended that the handpiece be lubricated again. If the handpiece is fibre optic, wipe off with alcohol swab before use.
