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

A children's race, young boys, young men; how I remember well, excitement sure, but also fear, it wasn't hard to tell.

They all lined up so full of hope, each thought to win that race or tie for first, or if not that, at least take second place.

Their fathers watched from off the side, each cheering for his son, and each boy hoped to show his dad that he would be the one.

The whistle blew and off they went, young hearts and hopes of fire, to win, to be the hero there, was each young boy's desire. One boy in particular, his dad was in the crowd,

was running near the lead and thought. "My dad will be so proud."

But as he speeded down the field across the shallow dip, the little boy who thought to win, lost his step and slipped.

Trying hard to catch himself, his hands flew out to brace, and mid the laughter of the crowd he fell flat on his face.

So, down he fell and with him hope, he couldn't win it now. Embarrassed, sad, he only wished to disappear somehow.

The Current Report

Heisler honored, student loan fund grows

William Heisler, DDS, Annual Fund campaign chair, was recognized for his outstanding leadership of that project at the University chapel on November 18.

The LLU Councilors also presented a check for \$38,000 to add to the dental student loan fund, completing their commitment of \$410,000 over the course of the sixyear campaign.

Lewis Johnson, president of the Councilors, made the presentation, and was introduced by **Judson** Klooster, DDS, dean, and Dr. Heisler.

Sponsored by the Century Club of the School of Dentistry Alumni Association, this campaign exceeded its goal of \$1.6 million for the loan fund, with \$1,634,000 already loaned to 261 students. An additional \$365,000 coming into the student loan fund will now bring the total to over \$2 million, assisting worthy students who have chosen careers in dentistry at Loma Linda.

One recipient wrote, "I thank those who have created this loan fund and express additional gratitude to those who have built and contributed . . . which has supported me much, much more than just in a financial and personal way—for you have helped pave and open my future to me, and for that I will always be grateful."

Motivated by the Councilors' challenge, dental alumni responded in increasing numbers during the campaign, with participation growing from 22% in 1986 to 34% in the final 1991-92 year. Alumni were joined by students, faculty, staff, and friends of the School to make this loan fund a reality.

"This was truly a School-wide project, spearheaded by the alumni and the Councilors," said Dr. Heisler. "The joy is seeing what a tremendous impact these loans have in the lives of our students. On their behalf we thank all those who participated in this campaign." Thanks for giving

The student conduct committee considered two problems in October and November.

The other problem involved the abuse of patient appointment telephones assigned to dental student use. These telephones were located in Jorgensen Memorial Library, and were available by student sign-in at the JML desk. Due to abuse, the phones were removed.

In both cases, the committee recommended citizenship probation.

The School is looking at telephone charge statements for the current year and invites students who may have misused the system to make arrangements with **Dr. Thor Bakland** to reimburse the School for longdistance calls made for private purposes.

The School is looking into the possibility of obtaining a line for a limited geographic area at a flat rate charge.

LLU serves at La Vida

It was an objective with dedication and reverence, sprinkled with love and sincerity—what a group of Loma Linda University dental students accomplished in late September at La Vida Mission for Navajo children.

The students, who paid their own expenses, drove from California to volunteer for the four-day clinic in desolate northwest New Mexico. The trip was planned to provide professional dental care for the 79 students who were beginning the school year at the Navajo boarding academy and for as many area Navajo Indians as time permitted.

La Vida is an independent Seventhday Adventist boarding school (preschool through eighth grade), sustained by donations and gifts.

J. B. Jablonski, DDS, director of extramural programs—known as Dr. J.—was the mentor for his 11 students. He was omnipresent moving through the school clinic to observe and provide hands-on instruction to the dental students at work.

All 79 missions students were screened for needed work. "All students were seen at least once," Dr. Jones' law: The man who can smile when things go wrong has thought of someone he can blame it on.

Make a child happy

The SIMS Adopt-a-Kid Christmas Party for local underprivileged children will be held on Thursday, December 3, from 6 to 8:45 p.m. in the campus cafeteria. Call Kim at 796-2009 for more information, or to find out about how you can help with the festivities. Jablonski tallied, "some three or four times . . . a total of 118 patient visits. We did it all: examinations, x-rays, fillings, extractions, sealants, and many tooth cleanings.

"If we had applied LLU fees, we provided about \$5,700 worth of dental care. If we had applied open market prices, I estimate \$8,000 worth of care was given these children."

Follow-up work will be handled by the volunteer dentists who serve the mission on a weekly basis.

When asked why the LLU group came to La Vida, Dr. Jablonski responded, "I have a philosophy religious and total life style. It's a philosophy that cannot be separated. Serving people is an expression of God ... adhering to the Golden Rule of doing unto others as we would want others to do unto us.

"These students also come here with a commitment. It's to serve others... with a bit of adventure and a little course credit. They feel a sense of dignity and pride seeing each child smile with bright white teeth."

The clinic's two well-outfitted dental rooms were augmented with four makeshift, but functional, set-ups. They resembled a television M.A.S.H. set.

Dental chairs were modified, lightweight, lawn chaise lounges, but each station was adequately serviced with lights, air, water, suction, and electricity to operate modern dental equipment. Service lines were connected from the dental facilities to the suction and air generators in Dr. Jablonski's vehicle.

"Office hours" began at 8:30 a.m. and continued through the day until all scheduled visits were concluded.

La Vida Mission was a culture shock for some of the LLU students. Students were housed with mission staff families.

Meals were shared with the children in the cafeteria or with the host family. There is no snack bar or restaurant within 60 miles of La Vida, but the dental students enjoyed mingling with the children at mealtime.

Recreation was negligible for what free time they had. However, they were able to ride mission horses and hike along trails through the nearby rock formations, and play volleyball with the children in the gym.

Departing for the trip back to California, the dental students had a sense of fulfillment seeing the bright smiles on the faces of their new young friends.

On the heels of the dental students, eight LLU medical students and two pediatrician nurse practitioners flew into La Vida Mission on four small aircraft.

As a self-sustained entity, La Vida Mission has many needs besides cash donations for operating, evangelism, and worthy student aid.

For the children, the mission could use towels, sleeping bags, and chewable multivitamins. The clinic, which also serves community Navajo, needs a table x-ray power unit, antibiotics, nasal and eye solutions, and insulin.

The school could use computers, a video projector, general school supplies, books, and \$1,200 for roof repairs.

Ulf Wikesjö, DDS, graduate director of PhD. periodontics, was a judge for the scientific orban competition and chair of a research forum. Afterwards Dr. Wikesjö met Rudolph Hahn, DMD, chair, for a trip to Epcot Center. Additionally, a resident faculty dinner was held in Orlando.

Restorative dentistry

Much of the focus was on esthetic dentistryparticularly in intra-oral cameras and dental imaging, dental adhesives, and high-speed disposable handpieces. One booth even promoted "Mint Snuff," a non-tobacco, non-nicotine, all-mint chew for any who desire to knock the habit.

• The Mosby Yearbook of Dentistry, dedicated to publishing excellence, has selected two articles to be abstracted in the 1993 version: Microleakage of crowns cemented with glass ionomer cement: Effects of preparation finish and conditioning, and Margin designs and fracture resistance of incisal resin composite restorations. In addition, the Odontology Digest/Bugamor International in Europe has selected two articles to be published: Marginal leakage of cast gold crowns luted with an adhesive resin cement, and Fracture resistance of composite and amalgam cores retained by pins coated with new adhesive resins.

• Anthony Tjan, DDS, director of biomaterials research, has been appointed as an external examiner in dental materials by the University of Malaya. He has also been invited to become a foreign advisor of the University of Tanta and the University of Mansoura, both in Egypt, for their PhD programs in dental materials.

In sorrow

We recently heard of the passing of Phyllis Carman, wife of Dr. Eldon Carman, associate director, General Conference health department, (their son, Eldon P., graduated in '77, and from graduate endodontics in '80), and the tragic circumstances surrounding her death.

Dr. and Mrs. Carman were in Russia to attend the opening of the new Moscow SDA dental clinic, when Mrs. Carman began feeling ill. The Carmans were enroute to meet an ambulance when Mrs. Carman collapsed, suffering a massive heart attack.


Tragically, though they were just moments from the ambulance, the emergency vehicle was not prepared with any equipment which could have resuscitated Mrs. Carman.

For the last 20 years, Dr. Carman, with enthusiastic support from Phyllis, has served as the principal coordinator of recruitment of dentists and dental technicians to staff the SDA dental clinics in dozens of overseas settings. He has been a close colleague of the School of Dentistry in this endeavor, and has become friends with many students who are under deferred mission appointment or who are considering such appointment.
