The Current Report



Dental Foundation of California gives generous gift to School of Dentistry

A gift of \$8,500 was recently presented to the School of Dentistry by the Dental Foundation of California, bringing their total gifts to the School since 1985 to approximately \$100,000.

These donations have been given to worthy students in the form of \$1000 to \$2000 scholarships. Every year seniors are chosen on the basis of several criteria. They must be in the top half of their class, demonstrate clinical excellence, and be in particular financial need. They must also show profes-

sionalism in patient management, and give evidence of personal responsibility and leadership capabilities.

Last year five students received \$2000 scholarships. Recipients are announced each year during the awards ceremony in May.

The Dental Foundation of California has a long history of support and mentorship of the students of Loma Linda University School of

Dentistry.

In the early- to mid-1970s, the Foundation sponsored practice management seminars for dental students at LLU, USC, and UCLA. Since 1985 this non-profit group has given everything it makes to hygiene schools, community colleges, mobile clinics, dental technology programs, vaccination programs, and the three aforementioned schools. They are particularly interested in helping

students develop ethical principles and practice management skills.

The Foundation is assisted by members of four dental societies: Los Angeles, West Los Angeles, San Fernando Valley, and San Gabriel Valley. Despite their distance from Loma Linda University, involved LLU alumni and friends—such as Euell King, SD'59, and George Gamboa, DDS, part time associate professor of oral surgery at LLU, both Foundation board members—actively promote the School of Dentistry as a recipient of the Foundation's scholarships.

"Many of our most capable students have benefited by support from the DFC student scholarships. These alumni are most appreciative of the help provided them by the foundation; in some cases the awards came at crucial turning points in their student lives, when the continuation of their professional education seemed threatened by financial stresses," notes Judson Klooster, DDS, dean of the School of Dentistry.

Phonathon raises \$125,480

The Century Club Annual Fund phonathon concluded in March with a total of \$125,480 in pledges received from alumni for the 1992-93 campaign. A total of 46 volunteers participated this year, many on several different evenings.



Those who attended were involved in various meetings, workshops, and presentations, including following: Dr. L. Bakland was one of the speakers at the joint symposium, Priorities for Future Dental Pulp Research, and presented a research report on Odds Ratios for Associated Factors in Pulpitis. The latter was coauthored by Shelley Aronson, SD'84, PG'92, and M. A. C. Frankson, MD, a graduate student in epidemiology. Dr. Bakland also served as immediate past-president of the Pulp Biology Group of the IADR.

Ron Dailey was chair of the financial aid section, and attended workshops on testing effectiveness, success skills for students, and faculty evaluations.

Drs. Dunn, Berry, Riegel, Nemetz, and Schlenker gave poster presentations, and Dr. Heisler gave an oral presentation. Drs. Berry and Riegel also attended workshops on problem-based learning and critical thinking, psycho-motor skills, and writing better tests.

Dr. Lee gave a poster presentation, which was co-authored by Dr. Tjan and S. Y. S. Lee. And, student Steve Christiansen also presented a poster project.

Todd Murdoch attended meetings on business and finance, and—on a side note—visited Northwestern

dental school while in town. He notes that, like LLU, Northwestern is heavily dependent on clinic productivity and has a similar class size. Mr. Murdoch spent one morning with their financial officer, making comparisons between the two schools. He reports that LLU compares very favorably. Our school, while maintaining similar tuition, is able to employ a greater support staff due to substantial clinic revenue—an important by-product of clinic productivity.

Drs. Lessard, Herrmann, Finkelman, Haney, Sigurdsson, Selvig, Kettering, Nygaard-Ostby, and Wikesjö also presented papers. In addition, Dr. Wikesjö successfully orchestrated an IADR symposium on wound healing models in periodontal reconstructive surgery. The symposium is shortly to be published in the *Journal of Periodontology*. Additionally, during the meeting Dr. Sigurdsson, his wife—Ms. Karadottir,

and Dr. Wikesjö were invited as

guests to the Hu-Friedy company.

Some repeated issues which came up at the AADS meeting were on teaching critical thinking skills; developing technologies in dentistry and "informatics" (how we process information and using technology to assist students); diversity issues, including women, minorities, and cultural differences between students, faculty, and patients; and health care reform legislation.
