We look forward to welcoming these students to our dental family.



Basic sciences

• E. C. Herrmann, PhD, associate professor of biochemistry and course coordinator for freshman biochemistry, was elected secretary of the section on biochemistry and nutrition at the recent meeting of the Association of American Dental Schools.

Continuing education

• The division of continuing dental education sponsored *Expanded Functions for the Dental Hygienist*, April 4 through 9. Lecturers were Joni Stephens, chair of dental hygiene; Robert Kiger, DDS, professor of periodontics; Bernard Byrd, DDS, chair of oral and maxillofacial surgery; John Leyman, DDS, assistant professor of dental anesthesia; and Dave Anderson, DDS, chair of dental anesthesia.

Thirty-five hygienists attended to review and upgrade skills in local anesthesia injections, soft tissue curettage, and nitrous-oxide administration.

On the evenings of April 7 through 9, these hygienists provided free teeth cleaning to approximately 80 community members in exchange for practicing the above skills.

Endodontics

• The American Association of Endodontists celebrated its 50th anniversary, April 28 through May 2. The annual session was held in Chicago, where the original yearly meetings of the AAE took place. The School of Dentistry was well represented in the program.

Mahmoud Torabinejad, DDS, director of graduate endodontics, received the Louis I. Grossman Award for cumulative publications of significant research studies which have made an extraordinary contribution to endodontology. 3 Dentalgram deadline is the 25th of each month. Published not only in Dentalgram, but also in TODAY and sometimes in Scope, they add credibility to the programs offered at Loma Linda University! The presentation was made by the AAE president, Dr. Stuart Fountain, who read a letter from Dean Judson Klooster congratulating Dr. Torabinejad on the award and the AAE on its anniversary. Dean Klooster had intended to attend the award ceremony, but was unable to do so because of his recent heart surgery.

Previously (in 1986), Dr. Torabinejad received the Ralph T. Sommer Award for being the principal author of a publication of specific significance to the science and art of endodontology.

Numerous scientific presentations were made by graduate students, faculty, former visiting faculty, and alumni. All attending participants were funded primarily through personal means and, in part, by the department's research fund, which does not come from the School budget.


International dentistry
