Denti-Cal benefits to change

Denti-Cal benefits for adults (ages 21 and over), except those who are under long-term care, will change on August 15.

Any NOA (notice of authorization) issued prior to August 15 and submitted for payment with dates of service on or after August 15 will be subject to processing under the guidelines of the new program.

Dentists are encouraged to submit a new "Treatment Authorization Request" for any of the procedures affected by the new basic program.

Paul Revere, pioneer dentist

(excerpted from Topical Times, July-August, 1993, Vol. 44, No. 4)

The postal administrations of most countries have paid scant attention to dentists and dental health. The U.S. is no exception, issuing only one stamp directly associated with dental science.

Dentistry as a branch of medical sciences is of relatively recent vintage. In the past, dental problems were generally left to local elders and "wise women."

Dental care of the local inhabitants was not clearly addressed in the early days of colonial America. Visitors from abroad often remarked on the bad condition of colonists' teeth.

The making of dentures was usually practiced by the mechanically gifted, but the production of dentures was seldom their main occupation.

One pioneer American dentist who has been depicted on U.S. postal items is Paul Revere (1735-1818). For much of his life, Revere was hardpressed to earn a living for his large family... and attempted varied avenues for meeting his economic needs. His foray into dentistry was one of his more innovative activities.

Revere advertised as follows in the June, 1770, Boston Gazette:

"Paul Revere . . continues the business of a Dentist and flatters himself that from experience he has had for these two years (in which time he has fixt some hundreds of teeth) that he can fix them as well as any surgeon dentist who ever came from London. He fixes them in such a manner that they are not only ornamental but of real use in speaking and eating. He cleanses the teeth and will wait on any gentleman and lady at their lodgings. He may be spoke with at his shop opposite Dr. Clark's at the north end where the gold and silversmith's business is carried on."

Grammar tips

Never place a comma between two sentences or independent clauses. This is one of the most serious errors a writer can make.

Example: "The boss arrived late, she blamed her tardiness on car trouble."

These two sentences should be separated by either a semicolon (;) or a period. If they are separated by a semicolon, the first letter in the word "she" should *not* be capitalized.

If you're unsure whether you've made this error, separate the phrases on either side of the comma. If they can stand alone and make sense as a complete sentence (i.e. "The boss arrived late." and "She blamed her tardiness on car trouble.") then you need periods or semicolons.
