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

New classes begin

We are pleased to welcome the 79 members of the dental class of 1997. The class includes students coming from 23 different universities and colleges. The largest college representation, again this year, is from Pacific Union College. There are 52 men and 27 women, with an average age of 25 years old. Don and Jenny Lee, married for one year, are both members of the class. John

Willardsen, along with his brother-inlaw, Clark Cressman, joins his brother, Jim Willardson, who is a member of the class of 1996.

In the class there are two dental hygienists, two medical technologists, one nurse, one respiratory therapist, several engineers, a realtor, a barber, and a sales person who worked with laser technology in dentistry.

Biology was the college major of 17 in the class, with other majors including music performance, history, English, art, business, psychology, biochemistry, engineering, accounting, urban planning, economics, physics, and physical education.

There are 18 international students, including four from Korea, three from Canada, two each from Taiwan and Jordan, and one each from India, Mexico, Iran, Japan, Vietnam, France, and the Philippines. The class also includes students from 13 states in the United States.

Eight students, Richard Cho, Brent Heinrich, Aaron Honke, Kris Kanas, Grant Lyman, Doug Sandquist, Steve Sanford, and Erik Wolfe, are sons of School of Dentistry alumni. There are six class members with the surname of Lee, and two each whose first name is John, Brent, Harry, Danny, Susan, Jeff, or Hung.

The students bring varied backgrounds which have helped prepare them for service. Four members of the class were student missionaries, and four others have served as resident assistants during their college years. Traci Doan, a member of the class, was introduced to the LLU campus as a child who was a refugee from Vietnam, sponsored by the Seventh-day Adventist Church.

Administration

• Thor Bakland, DDS, executive associate dean, took part in the Commission on Dental Accreditation site visit to Marquette University Dental School, Milwaukee, Wisconsin, September 27 to October 1. Dr. Bakland is a curriculum consultant to the Commission, and took part in the 1991 accreditation visit to UCSF.

The Commission is composed of members from the American Dental Association, the American Association of Dental Schools, the American Association of Dental Examiners, various dental specialties, the American Dental Assistants Association, the American Dental Hygienists Association, the National Association of Dental Laboratories, the general public, and dental students.

- Judson Klooster, DDS, dean, presided over the final board of directors meeting of his term of office as president of the American Fund for Dental Health, the week of September 27. His term will end on December 31. During his tenure as president, AFDH has launched the "Oral Health 2000" initiative, a broad-scale public awareness program about the importance of dental health, for which Dr. C. Everett Koop, former U.S. Surgeon General, has served as an official spokesman.
- Leif K. Bakland, DDS, associate dean for advanced education, and chair of endodontics, represented the School at a discussion on the future of dental education, held at the National Academy of Sciences and conducted by an Institute of Medicine (IOM) study committee.

The meeting Dr. Bakland attended was part of an 18-month study to identify measures that will strengthen dental education in the U.S. The

IOM has met with and will continue to meet with various interest groups.

Dr. Bakland was part of a faculty panel that presented to the IOM concerns, suggestions, and statements of interest to dental school faculties. The members of the IOM committee were very interested in what the faculty members had to say, both about what is good about dental education, and also about problem areas. The latter seemed to focus on lack of time to do things other than teach classes, clinic coverage, low pay, and difficulty in fitting into the curriculum all the information currently available in dentistry.

The committee chair, Dr. John Howe, urged the faculty panel to ask members of their various school faculties to send in ideas and recommendations that may be of interest to the committee as it prepares to publish its report in the fall of 1994. Faculty concerns can be sent to this address:


