The Current Report

In memory of Robert A. James

The School of Dentistry mourns the loss of Robert A. James, DDS, 64, beloved professor and director of the advanced education program in oral implantology, and director of the Oral Implantology Center. Dr. James

suffered a massive heart attack over Presidents Day weekend and died at his home.

His funeral service on Thursday, February 24, was followed by a memorial service on Saturday, February 26. Nearly 500 people gathered at the Campus Hill Church to share their grief and support with his family.

Dr. James was honored by administration, faculty, students, and family. Speakers included Charles

Smith, DDS, former dean who hired Dr. James; Judson Klooster, DDS, dean; Reese Jenkins, Dr. James' pastor when he lived in Bermuda; Norman Cranin, DDS, oral implantology mentor; Vickie Gann, secretary; Nicholas Caplanis, DDS, oral implantology resident; Jaime Lozada, DDS, acting director of the oral implantology program; Irving Logan, DDS, director, graduate program in prosthodontics; Dr. James

Jetton, long-time friend; Ronda James-Grearson, SD'88, daughter; and James Crawford, DDS, associate dean for educational services.

To honor Dr. James' love of chamber music, the Sterling Strings performed several selections. Their


contribution was arranged by Polly Sprague, SD'97, violinist.

Dr. James was considered one of the pioneers in the field of oral implantology, and was recognized worldwide as an educator and teacher of this increasingly important area of dentistry.

A 1960 graduate of the School of Dentistry, University of Southern California, he practiced in Bermuda for 10 years, then was invited to Loma Linda Univ-

ersity to lead research in oral implantology. He received a master's degree in oral pathology from LLU in 1972.

In 1976 he founded the country's first university-based program in oral implantology, and the LLU School of Dentistry accepted its first post-graduate students in 1977. Besides his position at Loma Linda, Dr. James also held faculty or consulting appointments at the University European du Travail, in Belgium; the Charge

d'Enseignement a la Facultate de Medicine, in France; the Jerry L. Pettis Memorial Veterans Hospital, in Loma Linda; and the Loma Linda University Medical Center.


Dr. James served as president of the International Congress of Oral Implantology, the American College of Implantology, and the Western District of the Academy of Implant Dentistry. Most recently, he was president of the American Board of Oral Implantology/Implant Dentistry, and vice president of the American Academy of Implant Dentistry. His honors include the Implantology de Monde award in 1976; the lifetime achievement Aaron

Gershkoff Award from the American academy of Implant Dentistry in 1988; and the LLU School of Dentistry Alumni Association "Alumnus of the Year" award in 1993.

Dr. James is survived by his wife, Nora Ruth James, and daughter, Dr. Ronda A. James-Grearson of Bermuda.

In lieu of flowers, the family requests that Dr. James be honored through the Robert A. James Memorial Scholarship Trust Fund. Remembrances may be made out to Loma Linda University, with a notation of Robert A. James, and sent to the office of the dean or the office of advancement.



Human deciduous teeth as indicators of environmental heavy metal exposure

Trace elements accumulate in tooth substance and other target tissues. Because of their metabolic inertness, the teeth form a depot which reflects the lifetime exposure of the individual to environmental heavy metals such as lead and mercury. Dr. Eide has analyzed thousands of teeth from ancient and modern man, as well as rural and urban populations, including samples submitted from California.

The tunnel preparation technique represents a new and controversial alternative to conventional Class II cavity preparation. Dr. Strand has examined the advantages and limitations of this technique in laboratory experiments as well as in ongoing clinical studies.

Dean's recovery going well


Dean Klooster sends greetings to the School family, and reports that his recovery is going well.
