Pediatric dentistry gets \$250,000 grant

Pediatric dentistry at LLU School of Dentistry is the recipient of a \$250,000 grant from the Hutto-Patterson Charitable Foundation of Los Angeles. The grant will support the renovation and remodeling necessary to establish a pediatric dental teaching clinic. Funding will be received over a five-year period, with the first gift of \$50,000 expected in April of 1995.


Richard Dougherty, a trustee of the Foundation, has been instrumental in identifying and evaluating potential recipients. He responded to the recommendation of his business partner, Noni Patchett. Mr. Dougherty and Ms. Patchett were welcomed on campus to personally tour the current facilities and evaluate the needs.

Participating during their visit last fall were John Peterson, Jr., DDS, director of the graduate program, and Wil Nation, DDS, chair of pediatric dentistry; B. Lyn Behrens, MB, BS, LLU president; Don Prior, vice president for advancement; and Albin Grohar, executive director of advancement. Others included School of Dentistry associate deans Jim Crawford, DDS, William Heisler, DDS, and Ron Dailey, PhD; with Barbara Bostwick, director of development for School of Dentistry; and Richard Schaefer, director of community relations for LLU Medical Center, who provided a tour of the new Children's Hospital.

The grant will enable the department of pediatric dentistry to relocate their operation, separating it from the main adult clinic, and provide significantly for remodeling and the purchase of equipment designed for pediatric dental care.

"We are so grateful to be selected for this generous grant," said Dr. Peterson. "The Foundation's foresight in providing support for improved teaching facilities will benefit not only current pediatric patients, but also the future generations who will receive care from our graduates."

Euel King, SD'59, presents a \$6,000 check from the Dental Foundation of California to Charles Goodacre, SD'71, dean. The DFC donates to the School yearly for student scholarships.



San Bernardino water district rescinds notice of violation

Following testing of the waste water from the School of Dentistry, the San Bernardino City Water Department rescinded its notice of violation on December 5, 1994. The violation had been issued to the School during June, 1994, after which the School began treating the water with several amalgam separating devices, using the protocol established in the Seattle area by the Seattle King County Metropolitan Water District.

The notice of violation occurred when the district found that waste water from the LLUSD clinic contained 450 times the allowable amount of mercury. Subsequent testing has shown that proper collection methods and times have greatly reduced the amount of mercury.

Testing is ongoing with several types of amalgam separators from different companies, which are located all the way from Riverside to Sweden and Austria.

The clinic will close at 11 a.m. on January 27 and February 3 for a cleaning bee to prepare for the accreditation site visit.

You'll be receiving further information via memo from Dr. Heisler. sending a notice of violation to the School of Dentistry generated much interest in the California Dental Association and the American Dental Association scientific councils.

Although this problem has been solved for the time being, testing will continue to determine which system is most effective in removing amalgam waste from vacuum systems as large as those used at the School of Dentistry.

William Heisler, DDS, associate dean for clinic administration, and James Redfield, director of dental maintenance, believe that amalgam separators will eventually be required to preclude the possibility of mercury entering the reclaimed water sources of Southern California. This follows a national and international trend.

The couple had just been married on Sunday, December 18, and were headed to San Diego, when they made a stop at a convenience store.



A School of Public Health student was returning to his car late at night, when he was accosted by two men with a gun. They took him and his car, drove to a bank, and made him withdraw money. They also relieved him of his coat and shoes before taking him all the way to Rialto and dropping him off on the corner of two streets.

What you may not have heard is that one of our School of Dentistry staff members played a role in his safekeeping.

Barbara Samuels, coordinator for radiology, was at home that evening with her husband and two children when they heard someone knocking about 8:30 p.m.

Her husband went to the door and, looking out, saw a young man with no shoes or jacket. He said he was an LLU student and that two men had taken his money and car. People in the first house he'd tried had been afraid to open the door, and he was again asking for help.

Mr. Samuels brought him in and let him use the phone to get in touch with his family. He was too distraught to do more than that, so the Samuels called 911 for him and reported the incident.


