Accreditation over; 5th floor breathing normally

"We are very pleased with the outcome of the accreditation site visit," says **Ron Dailey, PhD**, associate dean for academic administration and coordinator of the accreditation preparation. The team of dental professionals was on campus from February 7 to 10, evaluating the School's operation.

"They asked many penetrating but fair questions," notes Dr. Dailey, "and our subsequent discussion resulted in the development of a mutual respect between faculty, administration, and the visitors."

Each evening the visiting committee met with **Charles Goodacre, SD'71**, dean, and Dr. Dailey to review the day's results. This gave the administrative team an idea of how things were progressing.

The visitors were uniformly very complimentary of the collegial spirit and the commitment of faculty and staff. Following their meeting with the student body, they commented that it was the best representation of students in an open meeting from any school they had visited. They reported balanced feedback from the students, both positive and negative, and said they sensed a strong feeling of loyalty toward the School.

Dr. Dominick P. DePaola, dean of Baylor University School of Dentistry in Texas, and chair of the visiting committee, commented before leaving LLUSD that it "would be a wonderful place to be dean."

Some recommendations were made, the most significant being a comprehensive review to update curriculum. Following a self-study, the School's faculty and administrators had suggested this review to the Site Committee, who agreed with the recommendation.

Currently, the School of Dentistry program is a heavily scheduled curriculum of clinics, courses, and laboratory time. The resulting one-year study will aim to create a more flexible schedule.

In late March the Site Committee report will be sent to LLU and to the Commission on Dental Accreditation. The School will have 30 days to respond and clarify any statements. The Commission will meet in late July and will review the report and LLU's response, and will vote on accreditation. Subsequently, the School will receive formal word in August, and will have six months to initiate a response to their recommendations.

The School's administration is anticipating a positive response, and is already addressing some recommendations.

"We would like to acknowledge the many hours of preparation which Ron Dailey and his team have put into this project," says Dean Goodacre, adding, "their efforts provided many positive benefits for the School of Dentistry which will enhance our program for years to come."

The Current Report

School holds fifth Clinic With a Heart

The School of Dentistry hosted its fifth annual Clinic With a Heart on Sunday, February 26.

Approximately 140 patients were served and many different dental procedures were completed. Because the crowd was a little smaller than last year, no patients had to be turned away, and students and faculty were able to provide more than simple procedures where needed.

Each patient received a toothbrush and information on personal oral health care.

Over \$8,400 worth of services were provided by 250 volunteers. Again this year, students from the Chaffey College assisting program also participated alongside SD students, staff, and faculty.

Additionally, 15 dental supply companies provided free products for patient treatment.

Breakfast and lunch was provided for all the volunteers by the

Dental Student Association, which organized the event.

A raffle was added this year, and certificates for restaurants and compact discs, as well as a handpiece, were awarded.

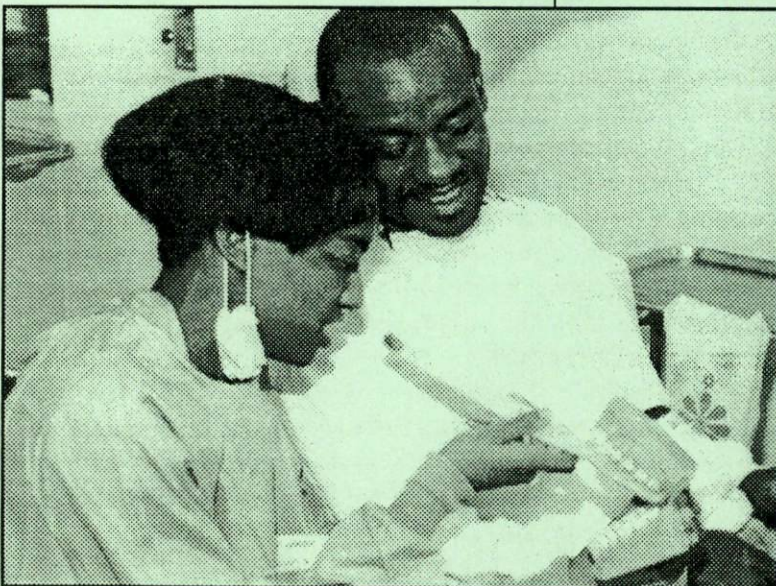
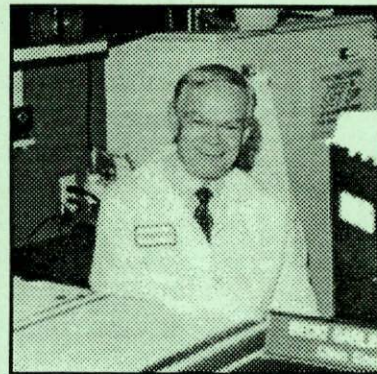
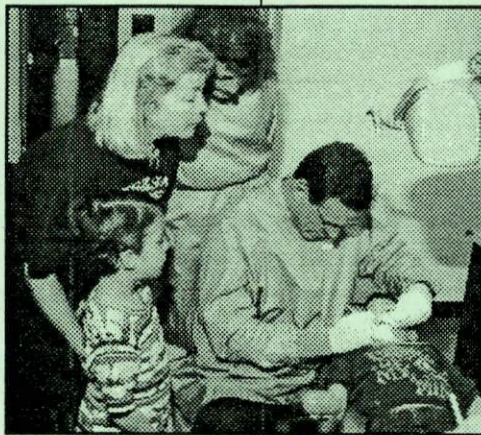
The event was covered by a San Bernardino Sun reporter, who wrote a glowing report for that paper.

Applicants reach record number

The admissions office reports that over 1300 dental applicants have applied to Loma Linda University for entrance in September, 1995. The class selection was completed on February 24. A class of 80 students with alternates has been selected.

Over 160 applications have been received for dental hygiene, and the admissions committee will be selecting 40 students for entrance this fall.

This represents an 8% increase in applicants for both the DDS and DH programs since 1994. The names of students selected for these classes will be released in April. SD

Faculty member writes new edition of textbook

The third edition of *Operative Dentistry* has just been published by Saunders. The 660-page text, which is intended for use by dental students, is currently used by a large number of dental schools and is also popular among dentists in general practice.

The authors are **Lloyd Baum, DMD, MS**, professor emeritus of restorative dentistry at LLU; **Ralph W. Phillips, DSc, MS**, deceased professor of dental materials at Indiana University; and **Melvin R. Lund, DMD, MS**, professor of operative dentistry at Indiana University, and a former LLU faculty member. Most recently, Dr. Lund served as a table clinic judge during the LLUSD Alumni-Student Convention.

Drs. Baum and Lund shared in writing and editing the 20 chapters in the book, while Dr. Phillips dovetailed matters of biomaterials consideration into each relevant chapter. Unfortunately, Dr. Phillips passed away in May, 1991; he had, however, completed all of his textbook material shortly before his death.

In addition to being a popular dental school textbook in the U.S., reports from foreign countries indicate a substantial interest among dentists in this well written and explicitly illustrated work. The book has already

been translated into Spanish.

Dr. Baum has written three additional textbooks in the field of restorative dentistry and continues to teach dental students in the International

Dentist Program, which he helped develop at LLU nearly 10 years ago.

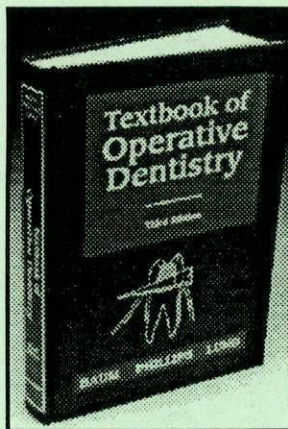

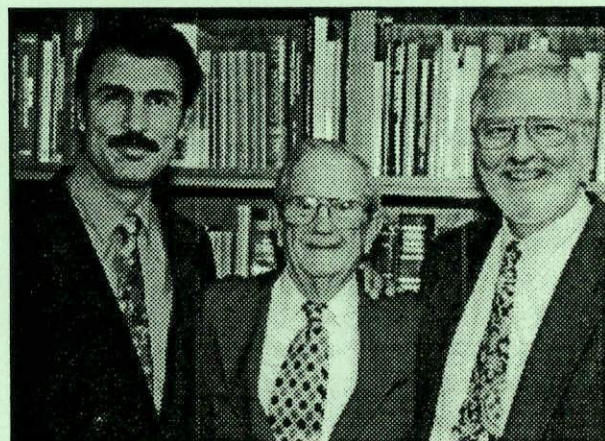
Dr. Kahn graduated from Loyola University School of Dentistry in 1937 and studied endodontics under Dr. Edgar D. Coolidge. An educator, author, inventor, and lecturer, Dr. Kahn was a charter member and one of the founders of the American Association of Endodontists. A Diplomate of the American Board of Endodontics, a founder and past president of the Coolidge Study Club, Dr. Kahn was also professor of endodontics at Loyola and later at Loma Linda University School of Dentistry.

"We are so pleased to see our good friend and colleague honored in this special way," said **Leif K. Bakland, DDS**, chair of endodontics. "Students and faculty in our department will benefit from this new fund in perpetuity . . . a wonderful gift from Miss Nelson." BB

Christian student honors Muslim fast

Brad van Mierlo, SD'76, a graduate student in endodontics, considers himself a non-denominational Christian. But, this year he decided to honor the annual Muslim fast of Ramadhan.

Brad had been discussing Ramadhan with one of his friends and classmates, Dr. Hamid Abedi. He subsequently decided to observe the fast for several reasons: first, out of respect for his Muslim friends, and second, because he admired the concept of practicing self-discipline to purify the body and be dedicated to things more important than food. Brad's wife, Mary, office supervisor in oral and maxillofacial surgery, also participated as much as possible.

Brad—with many of our Muslim members of the School family—observed the fast from the beginning of February to the beginning of March, a total of four weeks. During this time, he abstained from food and liquid from dawn to dusk.

He felt that he became much more focused during this time, and said that, after the first difficult week, his body seemed to adjust to less food. Overall, he found it a very positive experience.

The following description of the fast of Ramadhan was written by Hamid Abedi, DMD.

Fasting is a practice common to all the major religions of the world; the only aspect which differs is its duration and implementation. Every year Muslims devote one month to fasting. This is the month of Ramadhan, which this year coincided with February.

The fasting in its simplest form is the abstinence of eating, drinking, and smoking from dawn to dusk. This physical aspect, however, is only a small facet of the greater deed. In this month, the believer should abstain from all that is discouraged by God and is encouraged to do good deeds, such as helping the needy and devoting time to religious matters and reading the Quran, Islam's Holy Book.

By not eating and drinking the individual feels solidarity with the less fortunate and purifies the body of the excesses of the preceding year. The spiritual cleansing is a necessary requisite which follows if the intentions and actions of the fasting are carried out correctly.

This is also a month for the family. After a day's fasting, usually the whole family gathers together at sunset to break the fast and Muslims are encouraged to invite friends as well. This strengthens the bonds in the family and encompasses the notion of the community which is one of the main tenets of Islam.

Although it may appear to be a difficult task, after the first couple of days the body usually adapts very well and the inner strength the individual attains maintains the momentum for the rest of the month. Of course, individuals who are ill or cannot fast due to medical reasons are exempted.

The month of Ramadhan is a lunar month and starts with the sighting of the New Moon. The last day of the month of Ramadhan is celebrated throughout the world by Muslims, and we, too, would like to extend our warmest greetings to the readers: *Eid Mubarak* (Happy Holiday).

Alumni and School host 35th annual convention

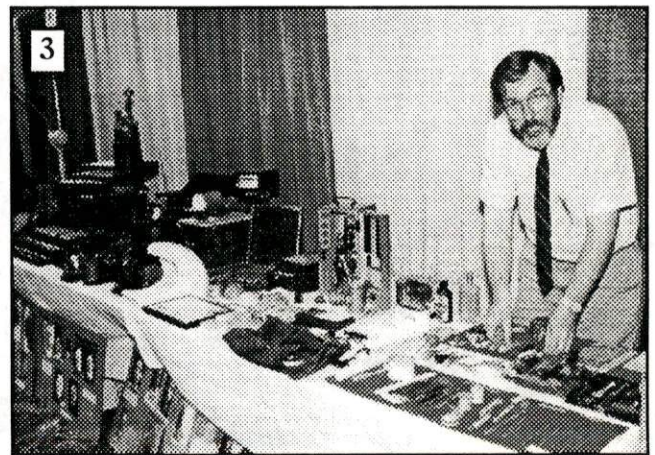
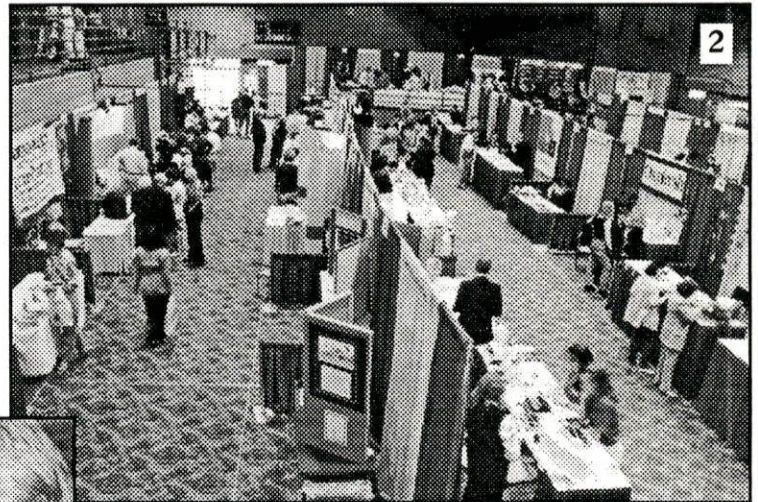

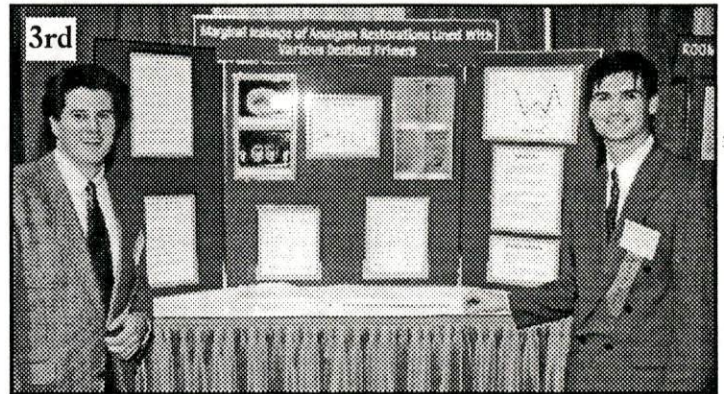
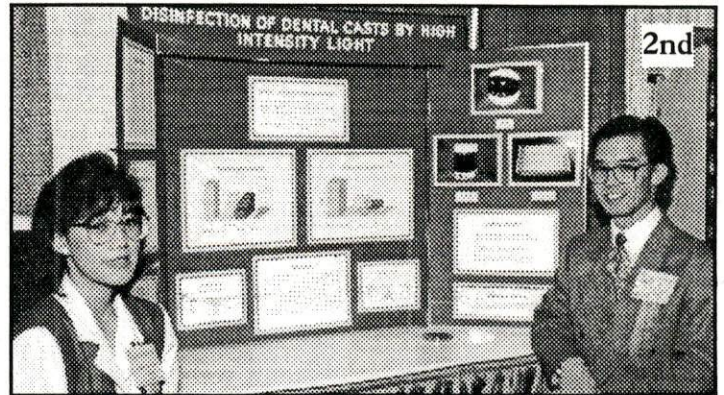
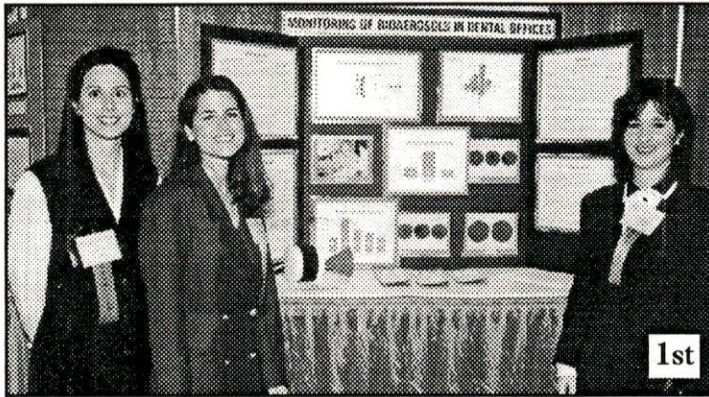
Those attending enjoyed the beauty of the historical Mission Inn with its intricate stained glass windows and many balconies.

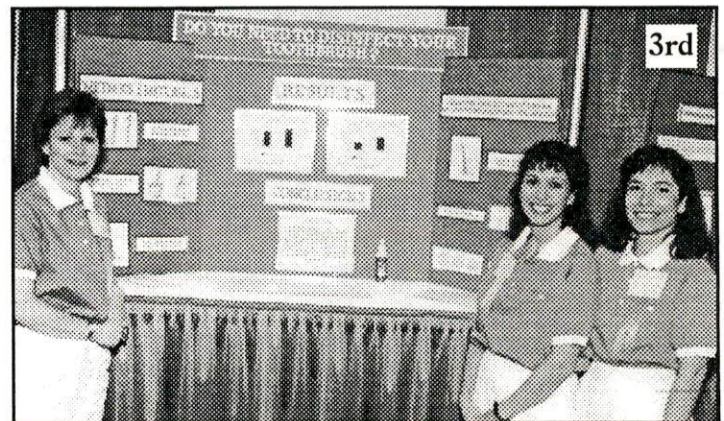
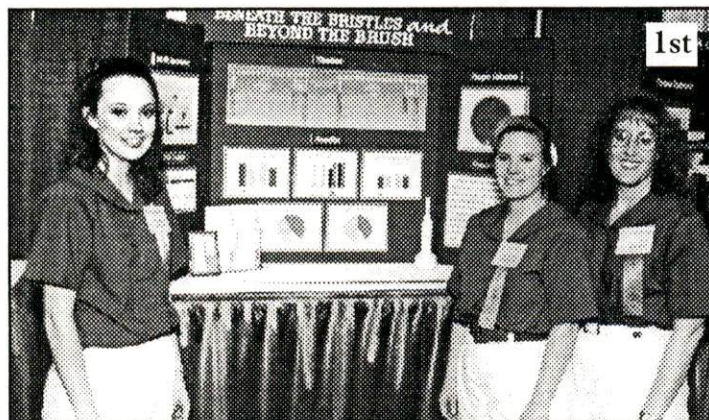
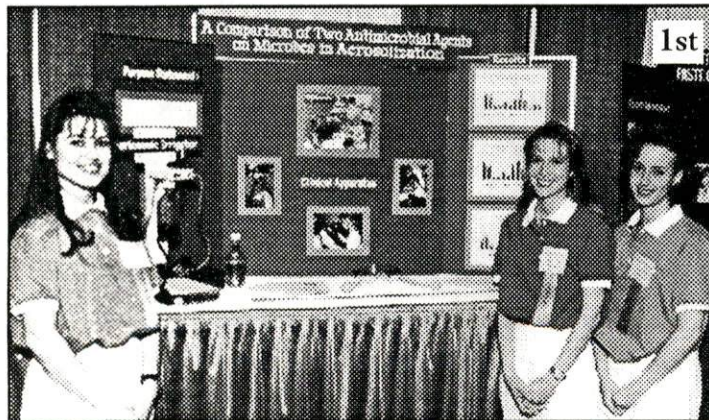
