

Passover



A Grief Observed

No one ever told me that grief felt so like fear. I am not afraid, but the sensation is like being afraid. The same fluttering in the stomach, the same restlessness, the yawning. I keep on swallowing.



Meanwhile, where is God? Not that I am in much danger of ceasing to believe in God. The real danger is of coming to believe such dreadful things about Him. The conclusion I dread is not "So there's no God after all," but "So this is what God's really like."

It is hard to have patience with people who say "Death doesn't matter." There is death. And whatever is matters Come, what do we gain by evasion? We

are under the harrow and can't escape. Reality, looked at steadily, is unbearable.

Something quite unexpected has happened. It came this morning early. For various reasons . . . my heart was lighter than it had been.

Lord, are these your real terms? When I lay these questions before God I get no answer . . . more like a silent, certainly not uncompassionate, gaze. As though He shook His head not in refusal but waiving the question. Like, "Peace, child; you don't understand."

The fruition of God. Re-union with the dead The mystical union on the one hand. The resurrection of the body, on the other . . . Heaven will solve our problems, but not, I think, by showing us subtle reconciliations between all our apparently contradictory notions. The notions will all be knocked from under our feet. We shall see that there never was any problem.

And, more than once [comes to me], that impression which I can't describe except by saying that it's like the sound of a chuckle in the darkness. The sense that some shattering and disarming simplicity is the real answer.

Portable units donated for extramural programs

In a recent visit to the School by Mr. Phil Smith from the Adec Manufacturing Company of Hillsborough, Oregon, he informed Dr. Charles Goodacre, dean, and Dr. William Heisler, associate dean for clinic administration, that five portable dental units are being donated for use in Dr. J. B. Jablonski's extramural programs.

This support had been requested from Adec by Dr. Jablonski since similar donations had been made to other programs, including a Rotary International Service Club program. This kind of support is greatly appreciated by the School of Dentistry and also by the students who provide the dental care in underserved areas.

Adec is one of the companies whose equipment is currently installed in the DAU clinic for evaluation prior to selecting a vendor for the new clinic equipment, expected to be installed within the next year.

Clinic equipment being evaluated

Currently several dental manufacturers have placed their latest models of dental chairs, units, and operator stools in the DAU clinic for evaluation by faculty, staff, and students. Several other companies will be placing equipment within the next few weeks. It is anticipated that a decision will be made sometime within the next four to six weeks on which vendors will be invited to submit bids. The bidding process will take place during the months of May and June.

Meanwhile, a campaign is being developed to solicit donations from alumni and others to support the reequipping of each cubicle throughout the dental clinics. This will include the installation of wiring for a computer terminal in each cubicle.

Recently the School has purchased for use in the clinic an AcuCam intraoral camera from the New Image Company. This intra-oral video camera will not only record action, both intraorally and extra-orally, but it has the ability to print still pictures of any dental procedure so desired.

The permanent addition of this piece of equipment to the clinical teaching program greatly enhances the ability to give instant feedback on clinical procedures, particularly in the restorative study clubs.

Dental Examination, as well as licensing procedures for dentists in California. The final meeting of the task force was held on April 10, at which time recommendations to the full Board and to the examining committee of the Board were finalized. These will be presented to the Board on May 19 for further consideration and/or adoption.

Some of the items being recommended are elimination of the full denture set-up and replacement with another removable prosthetics examination, probably similar to that used by the Western Regional Examining Board. Also being considered is the placement of a crown on a patient, with a fixed prosthodontics procedure to be done on a typodont. Written examinations covering dental ethics, California state law (the Dental Practice Act), and endodontics are also being recommended.

Clinical recommendations from recent accreditation site visit addressed

The pre-doctoral clinical program came through the recent accreditation site visit with only two minor recommendations.

The first deals with the assignment of patients so that there is not an inequitable distribution of patients among students. This is a reminder to

The second recommendation involves the recording of all radiographs in the radiographic log on the flap of the radiographic pocket in the patient's chart. Those departments which are currently not in compliance with this policy have been notified and procedures have been set in place so that all departments can come into compliance.

Computerized chair assignment initiated

With the recent reprogramming of our computer, chair assignment is now done via the computer for those students who have clinic assignments.

Three terminals are currently installed and an additional three terminals are planned (one in each preclinical lab). As students begin to understand the program more fully and can enter their requests more quickly, it is anticipated that this system will expedite the assignment of clinic chairs.

Students attend conference

Lori Lang, SD'95, president of the Student Research Group, and Greg Olson, SD'96, attended the ADA Dental Students Conference on Research held in Bethesda, Maryland, March 24 to 28. Several groups sponsored the students' attendance at the 31st conference: American Dental Association, Warner-Lambert Company, National Institute of Dental Research, and Loma Linda University

School of Dentistry.

Their agenda included two days of touring Washington, DC, and just over two days of informative meetings and tours of NIH and NIST.

Topics of research presentations included Inhibitors of HIV-1 in Salivary Secretions, Mechanisms and Treatment of Painful Neuropathies, and Salivary Gland Gene Therapy.


The students visited the DIR laboratories, and were able to

meet personally with Dr. Tessie Mc-Neely, scientific team leader of SLPI, in her laboratory.

Dr. McNeeley and Dr. Sharon Wahl, also a scientific team leader, were reported in a special to The New York Times Medical for their work on inhibitors of HIV-1 in salivary secretions: " . . . a number of scientists have tested saliva for its anti-HIV effects, and over the last 10 years they have reported finding that it had a general inhibitory effect on HIV." Drs. McNeely and Wahl headed up the team of immunologists and biochemists at

the dental institute who did a followup study, and "found that when they added SLPI (secretory leukocyte protease inhibitor—found in saliva) to test tubes containing HIV and monocytes, white blood cells with immune function, the viruses were unable to bind to the cell and therefore did not infect their usual targets. Tiny amounts of SLPI are strongly protective." Dr. McNeely suggested implementing SLPI in ointments, creams, and lubricants as a preventive device.

Both students enjoyed the conference. It was a golden opportunity to visit and question premiere researchers, become updated to the latest research, and to network. Lori Lang remarked, "whether interested in research as a career or practicing as a general dentist, the visit to NIH has educated me to the important role I have as a dentist to inform my patients how very valuable



An ADA reception dinner at Capitol Hill Club, Washington, DC, allowed students to network. At left are Congressman Porter (IL) and Lori Lang.






A group of students got a very cold reception on their recent mission trip to El Hongo when they were greeted by freezing temperatures and snow!



John Masefield 1878-1967 Learning the meaning of Passover

Last month two of us in the Graphics Studio—Richard Tinker and I (Sheila Elwin-Jasionowski)—participated in a Passover service for the first time.

Having always enjoyed the story of Moses leading the children of Israel from captivity in Egypt, I wondered why this holiday is not observed by Christians. It seems that anyone from the Judeo-Christian heritage with a belief in God could find it meaningful.

Our small group Sabbath school class responded excitedly to the idea of observing Passover this year, and we made plans for a traditional seder on Friday, April 14.

A lot of research went into our attempt, and from it grew respect for the many Jewish traditions. We discovered new practices, recipes, and literature.

Admittedly, we weren't able to follow everything "by the book," but we found ourselves really trying to stick as closely to tradition as possible for the meal. Somehow, it made everything seem more significant.

When the group of 17 was assembled, we lit candles on the table and throughout the kitchen and living room. Technically, this should have been done 1 1/2 to 2 hours before sundown, but we bent a bit to include everyone.

We also added the search for chametz (leaven) to the seder, though it usually takes place the night before. Jewish tradition holds that ridding the house of leaven also rids the mind of evil for the celebration of Passover. Taking a feather and spoon to scoop with, we "searched" the house for leaven, finding bits and pieces of bread and disposing of them.

This search may seem a little silly to those unfamiliar with Passover, but our research indicated that the holiday is supposed to be the most festive of all, including much singing and games for the children. The search for chametz got us into the correct mood for the rest of the evening.

Next, we followed the traditional order of service, with the youngest child asking his father four questions about the meaning of Passover and the symbols present on the table. Various blessings and readings preceded the meal.

Our leader explained much of the symbolism, and then added a Christian angle, comparing the Passover to the Christian communion service.

To honor the exodus of the Israelites, we took turns sharing examples from our own lives where we had felt "liberated."

Our group felt privileged to have taken part in something so significant, and felt awe at this connection with history. Several plan to make it a yearly celebration.

Passover in Israel

Drs. Michael and Etty Tagger are visiting dentists from Tel Aviv, Israel. We talked to them about their perceptions of Passover, and following is a summary of their thoughts.

Passover is actually a multi-faceted holiday. Officially, it celebrates Pesach, the passing over of the Israelite homes by the angel of death during the last plague on Egypt.

The Israelites marked their doorposts with lamb's blood for the first Passover. This is one reason that many Jewish families today place a prayer emblem at the entrance to their homes.

The second significance of

Mother's Day May 14



Passover is a celebration of the spring holiday, which marks the new year in the Jewish culture and observes the renewal of nature.

Additionally, Passover is meant to be a festive gathering of family. It includes many songs—with new ones added each year—and each family member leads out in some part of the service.

The family recites the *Hagaddah* and tells of the escape from Egypt. They take turns reading the verses so that everyone is involved.

In Israel the seder plate includes a shank bone, haroset, salt water, bitter herbs, and an egg, just as in America, but also added is a potato—the fruit of the earth.

Three matzos (unleavened bread loaves) represent three groups: the descendants of the high priests, often bearing the name Cohen or Katz; the descendants of the tribe of Levi, which served the Temple; and the descendants of Israel, representing the other 11 tribes. When the father breaks one as the afikoman, he chooses the one from which his family has descended.

At the end of the meal, a blessing is offered for the women who prepared it.

Passover is observed for seven days in Israel. Extensive spring cleaning takes place in orthodox homes (to remove leaven), sometimes beginning two or three months before the event. Some modern orthodox homes even have two kitchens, one for Passover and one for the rest of the year.

On a dental note, some people with dentures will take them to a dentist to have them specially cleaned for the holiday.

All activities surrounding Passover—even the cleaning—are anticipated with joy for this celebration of freedom.
