The Current Report

Welcome to the new students

The department of dental hygiene has welcomed 40 new junior students from 20 different universities and colleges.

The average age is 25, and the group includes five international students representing Canada, El Salvador, and Vietnam. Twelve are dental assistants, one has been a dental technologist, and one has been a Navy nurse.

Student Tina Morphis has the distinction of being a daughter and granddaughter of alumni of this school. Three others in this class are daughters of alumni, including Amy Feldkamp, Robyn Kiger, and Tiffany Ziegenhagel. Dr. James Crawford, executive associate dean, has the privilege of having his granddaughter, Heather Watts, in the class.

We look forward to becoming acquainted with these students who will bring enthusiasm and sparkle to the School.

We are also pleased to welcome the 90 members of the dental class of 1999, who represent 25 universities and colleges. The largest college representation this year is from La Sierra University.

There are 61 men and 28 women, with an average age of 24 years old. They come from 16 countries and 13 states in the U.S.

The class includes one medical technologist, one radiology technician, several engineers, a former professional

We hope that each student will find both challenge and satisfaction in their coursework, and see LLU as a caring environment during their years as student dentists.

New student assistants introduced to School family

Orientation for Chaffey and Baldyview student assistants was held. Approximately 60 students took part in the two-week orientation, listening to speakers who covered diverse topics in the dental field.

Duane Wacker, DDS, associate professor of restorative dentistry, spoke regarding DAU principles in school and private practice.

Chuck Yetter, assistant director of maintenance, conducted a tour of the School and presented a quick mini seminar on how to take care of equipment. (Chuck will conduct a continuing education class February 11 on keeping dental equipment in



good condition. It would be a great class for assistants!)

Michelle Rice, supervisor of patient relations, addressed the interaction between students and patients.

Mary Hartwell, clinic manager, spoke on professionalism in the dental office and hiring techniques.

Carol Sorrels, supervisor of dental radiology, gave a tour of radiology and demonstrated the two-towel technique for developing film.

During the second week of orientation, Todd Milledge, SD'88, instructor of pediatric dentistry, taught a nitrous oxide class, and Josonjia Thompkins, assistant supervisor of sterilization, demonstrated the School policy on sterilization techniques.

FAMILY CLINIC PROTOCOL

Purpose

Family Clinic is designed to make it possible for graduate, dental, and dental hygiene students to provide basic dental care for their spouses and children or for other dental and dental auxiliary students outside of the regular clinic hours and at reduced fees.

Eligibility

Beneficiaries are limited to students, their spouses, and children and parents for whom students ordinarily pay health care expenses. Brothers and sisters, in-laws, and other relatives and friends for whom students do not pay dental expenses may not be treated in Family Clinic.

Dental treatment

Procedures are limited to the following:

- 1) Silver alloy restorations including pins, if needed
- 2) Composite resin restorations
- 3) Prophylaxis including root planing, if needed

Radiographs

If radiographs are taken during regular clinic hours, the usual clinic fees apply. Since the intent of Family Clinic is to service urgent dental needs only, the student coordinator will be provided with films to be used during Family Clinic. Film usage will be limited to single films of the specific teeth to be treated. Full mouth x-rays will NOT be allowed.

Records

All patients will need charts. They will be identified

with a Family Clinic stamp and can only be used during regularly scheduled Family Clinic sessions. Students will be responsible for obtaining charts for their patients during regular clinic hours before the Family Clinic session. For new charts, screening sheets and registration forms must be completed and signed by the patients *prior* to any dental treatment.

Progress notes

The student dentist must follow regular recording procedures in the progress notes. This will satisfy the medical-legal requirements of the School in its responsibility to ALL patients treated in the facilities.

Faculty supervision

A faculty member must be present during the entire Family Clinic session. Duties include:

- 1) Providing signatures for permission to proceed in the progress notes of the record
- 2) General supervision of patient treatment for purposes of patient safety and adequacy of care

Charges

To help cover some of the material costs, the patient will be charged \$5 for each session. The fee will be collected by the student supervisor at the beginning of each session.

Number of sessions

Family Clinic may be conducted approximately once a month during the academic year. Clinics can only be held if faculty coverage is available. Sessions may not be conducted during academic recess.

Faculty/Alumni Bulletin

SD teacher represents school at AADS

George Lessard, PhD, professor of biochemistry and dental education, School of Dentistry, served as a representative of Loma Linda at two AADS conferences between October 18 and 23.

As councilor of the section on biochemistry and nutrition, he participated in the evaluation of recommendations of the Institute of Medicine report on dental education. This report, commissioned by the dental profession, makes 22 recommendations for the reform of dental education.

The conference ranked as most important curriculum reform, including a shift to active learning formats. Next was comprehensive patient care with a concomitant shift to competency-based as opposed to requirement-based criteria for graduation. The third recommendation was a shift from a surgical to a medical model for dental education, including integration of medical and dental foundation sciences.

As section councilor he also participated in the drafting of a set of national competencies for dental education. This set of valuable abilities and skills will be integrated into the new ADA Accreditation Standards for Dental Education Programs which will, after April 1, 1996, become the standards by which all dental schools will be accredited.

Dr. Lessard commented about the collegiality and enthusiasm which allowed participants at each of these important conferences to develop national agendas over very short periods of time and the unity apparent in the goals of the participants.

Twenty-nine of 38 LLUSD classes were represented at the alumni



other members of the D e a n's Circle at a special pre-reception. A l u m n i came from 11 states, including Arizona, Alaska, Arkansas, California, Colorado,




Georgia, Idaho, Nevada, Oregon, Texas, and Washington.


