# Best Research Award Goes to LLU Faculty


**Joseph Kan**, DDS, director of the Center for Prosthodontics and Implant Dentistry, received the Best Research Award for Oral Research Presentations for "Evaluation of Neurosensory Disturbance after Inferior Alveolar Nerve Transposition with Implant Placement" on March 7 during the 12th annual meeting of the Academy of Osseointegration in San Francisco.

Dr. Kan conducted the research with **Jaime Lozada**, DDS, director of the graduate program in implant dentistry; **Charles J. Goodacre**, DDS, MSD, dean; and **W. Howard Davis**, DDS, associate professor of oral and maxillofacial surgery at LLU, and professor of oral and maxillofacial surgery at University of Southern California

School of Dentistry.

The project will be published in the International Journal of Oral and Maxillofacial Implants.

## ABSTRACT

This study evaluated neurosensory dysfunction and implant success rate associated with sixty-four implants placed in 15 patients following transposition of the inferior alveolar nerve. A total of 21 inferior alveolar nerve mobilization surgeries were performed. The mean postoperative follow-up time was 41.3 months, with a range of 10 to 67 months. Neurosensory dysfunction was evaluated as it related to surgical technique and implant surface geometry by using light touch (LT) brush stroke direction (BSD), and two-point discrimination (2-P). The implant success rate was 93.8% (60/64). A chi-square analysis showed significant differences in the number of patients detected with neurosensory disturbances when evaluating the effects of surgical techniques (p+0.044). The surgical technique that involved detaching the mental foramen resulted in significantly greater neurosensory disturbance 77.8% (7/9) than the technique that left the bony foramen intact 33.3% (4/12) with an overal result of 52.4% (11/21).

#### New Rules for School of Dentistry Building Security

Effective Wednesday, April 2, 1997 all outside doors to the School of Dentistry will be locked at 5 p.m. Monday through Thursday and 3 p.m. on Friday and will remain locked through the weekend. This affects only entry into the building since the doors do permit exit at any time.

To enter after 5 p.m. or on Sunday, it will be necessary to use your ID card. Two doors have card readers which permit entry: the student entrance door and the loading dock door. Your card must be keyed to either door or in some cases will be keyed to both doors. In general, students' cards are keyed for the student entrance door and most faculty and staff have cards that are keyed to either door depending on the individual stated preference. Some faculty cards have been keyed to both doors. If you find that your card doesn't open one door, try the other.

Why make this security change? It is part of an overall effort to make Prince Hall a safer, more secure building in which to work and study. It will greatly reduce access for those who do not have any business in the School and at the same time allow those who work and study here appropiate access.

The cards, unless specifically keyed for entry anytime, will not allow access after 10 p.m. or during the Sabbath hours.

An additional security measure is the requirement that everyone – students, staff, and faculty – wear ID tags at all times while in Prince Hall. Please cooperate by pinning on your ID card and keeping it visible. The only exception is when you are dressed in a clinic gown which has your regular name tag attached.


In the near future, we expect to install security cameras to further insure a safe work/study environment.



Dr. Jean-Jacques Awoukeng is from Cameroun, Africa where he works at the Adventist Dental Clinic. He will return to Africa in six months.




Dr. **Tatiana Pravdina** is from Moscow, Russia where she has been working as a dentist at the Adventist Health Center for the past three years.

## Smoking and Implant Failure

Although the Branemark Implant System has repeatedly shown high success rates in long-term studies, Crawford A. Bain, BDS, DDS, MSEd, MBA, reports in *The International Journal of Oral & Maxillofacial Implants* (Vol. 11, No. 6, 1996), that several authors have reported patients who have lost an above-average number of implants. To date, writes Bain, the primary factors that predispose to implant failure are low bone density (type IV bone) and smoking.

According to Bain, twice as much type IV bone is found in moderate to heavy smokers as in light smokers and nonsmokers. He believes it likely that long-term smoking predisposes people to poor bone quality.

Bain conducted a study to determine whether a smoking cessation protocol influences the success rate of Branemark implants in those who follow it. The results of his study showed a significant difference between the failure rate between nonsmokers and patients who continued to smoke and between smokers who followed the cessation program and those who continued smoking.

Although cessation of smoking demonstrates considerable promise in improving success rates of implant patients, Bain notes that long-term smokers and/or very heavy smokers are less likely to benefit from smoking cessation than are light and short-term smokers.

Bain stresses the need for further research to identify the exact mechanisms whereby tobacco influences implant integration at the cell level.

Also at the same meeting, Dr. Keith Hoffmann served as moderator for the session on "Nerve Repair and Regeneration." • Alan Herford, SD 94, currently in the Oral and Maxillofacial Surgey Residency Training Program at the University of Texas, Southwestern -Parkland Hospital in Dallas won the first prize in the Resident Research contest given by the American College of Oral and Maxillofacial Surgeons.

Dr. Herford received the award of \$2,500 at the annual meeting of ACOMS in La Jolla, California. Dr. Herford's paper was entitled "Transdermal Nicotine and Smoking on Bone Formation and Tooth Development in the Rat". 
