LLUSD students receive scholarships

The new school year was made brighter for several Loma Linda University School of Dentistry students., who were awarded scholarships.

Charles Calder, SD'00, has been awarded a \$2,500 American Dental Association scholarship. According to Charles J. Goodacre, dean of the School of Dentistry, this award is given to only a few students across the nation. Calder's scholarship was based on financial need and academic performance. He is a mathematics graduate of University of Nevada at Las Vegas, is married, and lives in Loma Linda.

Juan Carlos Ramirez, SD'00, received a Hispanic Alumni of Loma Linda University scholarship at the Hispanic Alumni Awards dinner in October. The award criteria were academic achievement, community service (feeding the homeless), and SIMS (missionary) participation. He is single, lives in San Bernardino, and is a radiology graduate of La Sierra and Loma Linda Universities.

Three junior dental hygiene students have been awarded Procter & Gamble scholarships for the 1997-1998 school year.

There are 25 P&G/American Dental Hygiene Association awards given in competition with students beginning their dental hygiene course work across the nation.

The Procter & Gamble Oral Health/ADHA Institute \$1,000 scholarship was given to Holly Knauft, DH'99. The award was based on grade point average, an essay and community service performed in high school and college. She comes to Loma Linda University from Walla Walla College, where she completed her predental hygiene requirements. While in high school, Holly was a resident assistant, a school newspaper editor, and was selected as a speaker for the Week of Prayer. Holly also directed a peer counseling program at Walla Walla College entitled, "Talk It Out."

Gina Downs and Susan Sanchez, both DH'99, were given the Procter & Gamble Oral Care/ Hispanic Dental Association Foundation \$1,000 scholarships, based on an essay they wrote, community service, grade point average, recommendations and financial need.

Gina lives in Hemet, and has helped conduct health fairs, and given oral hygiene instruction to pre-kindergarten through first graders in Moreno Valley schools. Prior to her acceptance to Loma Linda University, she primarily attended Riverside Community College.






LLUSD students lounge around the fireplace instead of battling the windy elements.




devotional, depending on the amount of sleep they'd gotten in their lodge room, or what time they came in from the winding mountain roads.

The senior class put on their Chubby Bunny competition, drafting faculty Drs. Todd Milledge, Charles Goodacre, Willie









Over 500 people attended the picnic: 250 students with their guests, and 250 employees with guests. It was a good combination. This certainly was a fun day for all who attended.





"Marci is very helpful and good natured."


"Marci has been very helpful, not only to me but to our department. She goes out of her way in solving problems or just making things better. She is always on the go but never too busy to help."












Marci Stirl, Employee of the Quarter, is congratulated by Dr. Goodacre



A highlight of the Fall calendar for dentists is attendance at the American Dental Association meeting. This year's meeting was in Washington, DC and found several School of Dentistry faculty and many alumni gathered

The issue of specialty recognition for dental radiography also failed to pass the House of Delegates by a six vote margin.

Gabriel Ramirez will be leaving Continuing Education and joining our Data Entry Department.


Three new workers on our Sterilization team are Ambra Linnenkamp, David Ortega and Ratan Biswas.

Students report on '97 extramural mission trips

Papua New Guinea

As our airplane landed on the runway, we were dismayed to find that all around us were brown, dead-looking hills. We had expected something a little more tropical, but since no rain has fallen in the past 11 weeks, Papua New Guinea was not in its usually beautiful state. Smoke and fire were everywhere as careless villagers constantly set fires that burned out of control.

Our trip was not a pleasure vacation, but it was not quite as primitive as we had expected. The people there were very friendly, and treated



us very well. Over a twoweek period, Peter Nelson, SD'70, Erin Carpenter, SD'98, James Yoo, SD'98, and I treated more than 300 dental patients at the Sopas Adventist Hospital.

Ecuador

After long hours of daily work treating patients at the School of Dentistry, waiting for instructors and staying late with lab work, I had lost some of the love I had for dentistry. As the end of my junior year of dental school was drawing near, I began to feel like I needed to find again the reason why I was in dental school. The LLU SIMS (Students in Mission Service) director, J.C. Belliard, was talking about an upcoming trip to Ecuador and I became very interested.

Having always entertained the idea of going on a mission trip, but never taking the time to seriously consider it, I began to come up with reasons for my going on this mission trip: to serve others, to see Ecuador, to gain a perspective and an appreciation for a South American culture, and of course to gain some great dental experience. I also figured that there would be costs and sacrifices such as: several weeks away from home and family, missed clinic and school time, considerable need for money and other resources. I decided to go!

What I learned right away was, at the risk of making a cliché, that for every little bit you give and every small part of yourself you share, you receive that much more back in return. One example is the cost of my trip. After I committed to going, I found that it was almost completely covered between the Dental Alumni Association, the Dental Missions Department, and the SIMS office!

Upon arrival in Ecuador, we began to see the people's love, appreciation and generosity toward

Treatment included nearly 200 fillings, 150 extractions, and countless cleanings from betel nut stains.

The clinical experience we received was extremely valuable to us as well as providing desperately-needed help to many people. We were able to educate the nursing students on proper oral hygiene and etiology of dental caries and periodontal disease. This enabled them to apply this information to the patients that they care for at the hospital. Arrangements were made for a local dentist to spend one day a week at the hospital to care for dental needs there. Two of the ladies were trained to do some gross scaling on those who maintain regular dental care.

We all feel that, while we were limited in time and unable to give complete and comprehensive care to the patients, we were able to provide a basis so that regular, more comprehensive care can be given to the people at Sopas.

us. Growing up in the shelter and comfort of upper middle class suburban America, Ecuador immediately exposed me to the vastness and diversity of our world. We tend to think today that it's such a small world because of the Internet, phone calls, and our ethnocentric view of the world. Our medical, dental and public health team went to work in Quito, Guayaquil, the Galapagos Islands, and Concordia. I was in awe of the breadth of the Kingdom of God. Seeing the way many people live in a developing country, I grew in sincere appreciation for all that we have in the United States. And yet I became acutely aware of that commodity which even the most developed of countries, such as the U.S., cannot fabricate, import, export or trade: contentment.

More than any medical treatment we provided, we tried to share and show love to the people we saw. We hoped that in some small way, we could remind them that there is a God Who cares. Ironically, it was many of them who witnessed to us, reminding us of the importance of simple faith and the power of God in our lives. Even though I was one of the two in our 15-person team who didn't speak Spanish, I felt as though I could communicate with them through a common language: love. In the end, all that matters and all that will remain are people and the Word of God. It was through my trip to Ecuador, the experiences I had and memories I made with my team and the people of Ecuador, that I can say with no hesitation that everyone who wants to experience life as it was meant to be should go on a mission trip.




