



Polly Sprague, SD'96, received a Master of Arts in biomedical and clinical ethics.




Faculty members attend the commencement ceremony for the Graduate School, June 14 at 8:00 a.m.

Pastor Kasischke becomes assistant dean

The School of Dentistry has a new assistant dean, and if you can pronounce his name correctly (kuh-SISS-kee), you can probably also remember his title: assistant dean for admissions, service learning, and spiritual nurture, and assistant professor in the department of dental educational services. He's Fred Kasischke, DMin, formerly associate pastor of the University Church for 23 years, and teacher in LLU's Faculty of Religion and Marriage and Family Therapy Program.

What is service learning? Says the new faculty member: "It's a hot phrase for extramural [mission] projects like international missions, SAC-Norton, and others. We would like to see that expanded and developed. It's happening in a lot of contexts: behavioral science, business -- it's service-oriented for the community."

Part of his title is spiritual nurture. In four years, he and a leadership team in the University Church built the young adult Sabbath School class from about 50 souls to over 300, most of whom are university students. "It's a nice tie-in with School of Dentistry students," he says.

"I'm joining an admissions team that has a good track record. I would like to begin to track younger people who have an interest in dentistry, and maintain contact with them all the way through high school, college, and right on into the program here. We have 1800 applicants and only 90 slots. We're blessed with really high quality people, and continue the high standard of wholeness in dentistry that we've promoted."

Fred Kasischke was born and reared in Michigan, 90 miles from Chicago, in a family of five children. He met his wife, Diane Rayspes, at Broadview Academy in Illinois. They married in 1967, and now have three sons: Douglas, age 27, a second-year PhD student in early American church history at Vanderbilt University in Nashville; David, age 25, a business major graduate of La Sierra University, now the operations manager for Hospitality Dental [Irving M. "Bud" Feldcamp, SD'71] in San Bernardino; and Dustin, age 18, a senior at Loma Linda Academy and a lifeguard at Drayson Center. Mrs. Kasischke is a registered nurse for a state program called Newborn Screening.

Dr. Kasischke did his undergraduate studies at Andrews University and finished in 1968. He earned his Master of Divinity in 1970 from Andrews University, and his Doctor of Ministry at Fuller Theological Seminary in Pasadena in 1988.

"I've been a pastor since 1970, in Illinois, in the Southern California Conference, the Southeastern California Conference (SECC), and the University Church. I was a youth pastor for years, and did my doctoral work in family studies. I've done a lot of work with family ministries, both for the local church and the conference." He chairs the Family Ministry Committee for SECC, and is starting a new project there. He will continue to serve on University Church's building committee, and will continue with young adult (18-35) Sabbath School in the chapel.

Dr. Kasischke is also on the state committee for Child Abuse Prevention, contributing his expertise on building stronger, healthier families.


Yes, but what's he like in his home?

"We've built two homes in Redlands. I was owner/builder. We had an architect alter some plans, and we subbed it all out, but painted and landscaped on our own. I enjoy working in the yard, and gardening." The house has a modern mission look to it, with exposed beams and a sealed terra cotta tile floor. Outside, the triple driveway sports a basketball court, and red roses fall gracefully over the fence rails.

"I like to fool around in the kitchen," says Dr. Kasischke. "That's a hobby. I make a pretty mean apple pie, and persimmon cookies. I like Northern Italian food, wonderful pastas and their good sauces: heart-attack-on-a-plate kind of stuff. That's why I walk a couple of miles a day."


He also admits to being a sports nut. He's been active all his life: "I'm kind of a sports junkie. Most sports I really enjoy: golf, racquetball, basketball, tennis. I'm a Bulls fan, a Cubs fan, a Bears fan..."

Says William Loveless, EdD, senior pastor of University Church, "It's very easy to say and think good words about Fred. 


Charles J. Goodacre, SD'71, MSD, introduces Fred Kasischke, DMin, as new assistant dean for the School of Dentistry.



- •A-dec Updates Clinic Dental Units Some time after the installation of the new Adec dental units in the summer of 1996, it

became apparent that when the control head was allowed to turn freely on its support arm, damage was caused to the internal wiring.

After one "fix" proved unsuccessful, A-dec's engineers, in cooperation with Robert Johnson, of dental maintenance, designed an internal stop to prevent the control head from rotating more than approximately 270 degrees. This design change has now been incorporated into the production model of the Performer Dental Unit.

During the second week of summer break, Adec sent a team of two technicians who spent one week in our clinic retrofitting all 128 Performer units in the School of Dentistry. This was done at no cost to the School.

Faculty Dental Office Gets Major Overhaul

The three weeks of summer break found faculty members who treat private patients in the Faculty Dental Office on Taylor Street temporarily working in a new, albeit familiar, location. They traded places with their dental and dental hygiene students, using the DAU area of the School of Dentistry clinic to see their patients while the FDO experienced a major redecoration. This project was coordinated by Carlton "Woody" Wood, Loma Linda University Foundation Property manager, Chuck Yetter and Mary Hartwell.

The building was painted both inside and outside and the landscaping received a facelift. The light fixtures were replaced and new carpet and floor coverings were laid.

The staff of FDO has expressed gratitude to Jolene Farwell, DAU coordinator, for her help in making this temporary treatment facility work well.

This experience gave clinical faculty members a chance to treat their own patients in the clinic units, which were found to be very acceptable in the "private practice" setting.

It is anticipated that the redecorated FDO will be back in operation on July 9, so there will be minimal disruption to the summer quarter clinic operation.

Endodontics

- Mahmoud Torabinejad, DMD, MSD, PhD, professor of endodontics and director of graduate endodontics, visited Japan, where he gave lectures and continuing education courses to the Japan Endodontic Association (Yokohama); Endodontic and Periodontic Study Group (Osaka); Showa and Tsurumi Universities (Tokyo and Yokohama); and Otani Endodontic Society in Tokyo. The topics of the lectures included management of root perforation, endodontic emergencies, pathogenesis of periapical lesions, clinical application of MTA, perio-endo interrelationship, clinical applications of inflammation, and new innovations in endodontics.



Some IDP students treated patients in the prosthodontics section of the main clinic during the summer break while their chairs were being renovated.

Students, staff, faculty and patients in the IDP and TMJ clinics have commented favorably on the new look.

It is hoped that other units in the urgent care/screening area will get similar treatment in the near future.

Jim Redfield, director of dental maintenance, oversees the unlocking of a stuck door on the pediatric dentistry clinic.



Dr. Kantarovich and his wife have two children and reside in Orange, where he maintains a prosthodontic private practice.


He is now an assistant professor of restorative dentistry at LLU.

Old iron tooth discovered

The next time a patient begins to complain, it may help to remind them that dentistry has an older, richer tradition than is generally believed. Archaeologists in France recently found a wrought iron dental implant — in the upper right jaw of a man's remains — in a Gallo-Roman necropolis dating to the first or second century BC.

Because the implant and the socket match perfectly, and the iron and bone mesh, Eric Crubezy of Toulouse University and his coworkers conclude the implant maker used the original tooth as a model for the metal replacement. The procedure, however, must have been unpleasant: the iron tooth seems to have been hammered into place. Still, the patient apparently survived the procedure and used the tooth for some time thereafter.



Dr. Baum is one of the founders of the LLU School of Dentistry, and a member of the Pierre Fauchard Academy and Omicron Kappa Upsilon. He and others are working to establish a dental school at the University of Montemorelos, a Seventh-day Adventist institution.

Inter-American Dental Conference: Antigua, West Indies

During this past spring, Dr. James Crawford, executive associate dean, joined dental clinicians, staff and their families from the Caribbean Union to participate in their first continuing dental education and mission advance dental seminar. Here is his


The Inter-American Dental Conference seminar was held in St. Johns, Antigua. Attendees came from Trinidad, St. Kitts and Grenada. All of our dental clinics were represented, some with full delegations. There were also representatives from the local dental society. Dr. S. Raj and Dr. Hadeed, local dentists, and an Adventist dentist from Barbados, Dr. Hugh Hamblin, joined the group. In addition to the dental personnel, Elder John Josiah, Secretary of the North Caribbean Conference, and Pastor Arnaldo Gonzales, Health Ministries Director, attended all of the meetings.

The Governor General of Antigua, Dr. James Carlisle, provided the seminar introduction. He is an Adventist dentist, a very cordial and outstanding gentleman. He spoke about his own dental practice experience, and emphasized the importance of communication and meeting the needs of others -- concepts that helped him to build his practice. It seemed evident that these are the things that built him as a person, and as a diplomat within the governmental structure. He was appointed Governor General in 1993, has been knighted by the Queen of England, and is a very well-liked leader. There are some things he is not appreciated for such as not allowing alcoholic beverages at his State functions, which has met with considerable dismay on the part of many dignitaries. He has also declined invitations to meet with the Queen or other dignitaries for State business on the Sabbath. He provides for them, and delegates someone to host them, but he is extremely careful how he deals with Sabbath keeping and the health principles in which he believes.

Dr. David Anderson, from Pittsburgh, PA, presented the technical lectures on prosthetic dentistry, and was very well received. He did a masterful job in bringing spirituality into the lectures, and made them very appropriate for our Adventist dentists who were seeking a renewal of spirit as well as continuing dental education.

One of the adjunct benefits to this seminar was that at the same time we had an evangelistic crusade in progress by Pastor Saunders from the U.S., who is a dynamic speaker and has a beautiful singing voice. He is perhaps in his late 60s, and has all of the enthusiasm, determination and winning ability that is needed in such an activity.

Three tents were jammed to overflowing for each meeting. There were 122 baptisms on the third Sabbath and 121 on the fourth Sabbath. Another 100 persons were baptized on the fifth Sabbath. The support of the local church congregations is amazing. There must be at least 25 churches on the




island of Antigua, and all of them were present at these evangelistic services. Each church has a mini bus that normally transports members to church on Sabbath. They made double and triple trips to bring people to the tents by 8:45 a.m., with the meetings lasting until 1:30 p.m. From there they went to the baptism and on to another meeting at 4:30 p.m. How they pack all of this in is amazing.

A transformer blew out at one meeting, disabling the microphones. During the 30minute wait for repairs, one of the pastors began leading the congregation in singing, with tremendous enthusiasm for the entire time. From time to time one of the electricians would come out to the platform with an update on the repair work. With an enthusiastic spirit and mutual support such as this, it is not surprising that Inter-America is still one of the fastest growing divisions of the Seventh-day Adventist Church.

Our dental clinics are doing well. Each clinic has its own problems, but also their own blessings. God has put together a unique group of workers in each place, with the talents needed to do the work of that area. They all need support from local leadership, and the regular encouragement and recognition that their contribution is important in the work of our Church in meeting the physical and spiritual needs of their communities.

The Inter-American Division and the Caribbean Union, specifically, deserve congratulations for the progressive stance and strong support given the dental outreach program, adding to a rich program of whole person care.

Students on the Move


School of Dentistry recruits from Antillean University

School of Dentistry recruitment completed for 1998

The School of Dentistry has completed the process of interviewing and reviewing the students who applied for entrance to the predoctoral program. Statistics nationwide show that there was a five percent decrease in applicants to dental schools this year. LLU, however, had a seven percent increase in the number of applicants who applied for entrance this fall.

The Undergraduate Feeder School Report from the American Association of Dental Schools Applicant Service indicates that there were 600 students who applied from the University of California system alone, with UCLA leading the nation with 148 dental applicants. Of the applicants from the UC schools, the LLU School of Dentistry received 326 applications with 90 applicants from UCLA. According to this report, the second largest number of applicants from a feeder school to LLU was Brigham Young University with 26 applicants. La Sierra University came in third with 22 applicants to the LLU School of Dentistry.


Of the 8,173 applicants to US dental schools, 3,027 or 37 percent were women. The diversity of the applicant pool is indicated by the statistics that 37 percent of the applicant pool come from under-represented groups. The major of biology is the choice of over 46 percent of the applicant pool. There were 2,340 who applied to dental schools who are not US citizens. Over 50 percent of the applications to LLUSD are from under-represented groups in the United States.

Loma Linda University continues to accept 90 students for each class while some of the other schools in the nation have decreased their class size. Since 1988, six dental schools have closed. One new dental program opened in 1997 at Nova Southeastern University in Florida. In 1989, there were 426 applicants to Loma Linda University School of Dentistry. With this year's applicant pool of 1,816 and the closing of a number of major schools in the nation, there is a clear understanding of why the competition has been increasing for the remaining positions in the US dental schools.

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SOS Clinic grateful to LLUSD students

Tooth coating chemical stunts mice

London (Reuters) - A chemical compound used in protective coatings on teeth and other consumer products stunts the sexual development of male mice, a science magazine

Frederick Vom Saal and researchers at the University of Missouri found that bisphenol A. which mimics the effects of the female hormone estrogen in test tube studies, seems to disrupt normal hormonal functions in male fetuses whose mothers were fed the chemical.

"At birth, the male pups were smaller than normal and had seminal vesicles that were 12% smaller than those in controls. In adults, seminal vesicles secrete the fluid in semen,"

said.

Vom Saal said lower doses of bisphenol A used in the animal study were proportionally equivalent to the amount swallowed by patients in the first hour after treatment with a sealant containing the chemical. Scientists suspect that bisphenol A may interfere with the body's endocrine system to cause reproductive problems.

The British arm of the World Wide Fund for Nature has written to the Department of Health seeking a reevaluation of the use of bisphenol A.

Steri-Oss to provide scholarships
