eXcite '98 'draws' upon talented dental students

On Thursday night, there were about 500 Gen-Xers gathered at the La Sierra University Church in Riverside. On Friday, the number doubled. On Saturday, it swelled to about 2,000 people. All eyes were upon Aaron Soeprono, SD'01, who painted a mural on several canvases in the choir loft of LSU's

eXcite '98 was a spiritual revival weekend held August 6 - 9, planned by and geared toward young Seventh-day Adventists.

Mr. Soeprono worked on his painting throughout the weekend event. The finished artwork will be displayed on worldwide satellite television during the autumn Net'98 programs broadcast by the Seventh-day Adventist Church. In addition, the canvases may go on display at the General Conference building, world headquarters of the Seventh-day Adventist Church, in Silver Spring, Maryland.

The artist explains his work in this way: "In grasping for control, we limit our God, cramming Him into a 'Sabbath box' that we can visit in our

spare time, letting the tree grow, but within the confines of our convenience. We spend our time sitting back, behind our barriers, gazing through the glass at the thought of capturing that moment, rather than climbing the tree. The once-powerful river has been dammed up and sits stagnant, while disease eats away at our fellowship. The cleansing spring of communion has turned destructive, and the unstoppable force of our moment now in stale complacence. A trunk can only support its branches, and only the branches can bloom. Only we can make this tree fruitful."

Another student dentist, Jeremy Abbott, SD'01, worked on the steering committee, attending meetings, brainstorming, getting people and local churches involved in the event, providing airport transportation, and setting up audio equipment. He became an eXcite '98 team member in April, when he became acquainted with eXcite's founders, Shasta Emery and Jennifer Tyner, at the Adventist Intercollegiate Association meeting. Ms. Emery is president of AIA, and Mr. Abbott is vice president.

Former School of Dentistry employee tells of life after Sudan bombing

On August 20, the United States sent Tomahawk missiles into Pakistan and Sudan, in an attempt to strike alleged terrorist financier, Osama bin Laden, and groups affiliated with him.

In Khartoum, the Sudanese capital, a pharmaceutical factory suspected of producing a component of sarin nerve gas was bombed at about 7:30 p.m. The factory was located about 15 kilometers north of the flat of Laurie Wilson, a nutrition surveyor in the employ of Adventist Development and Relief Agency (ADRA), and former employee of the School of Dentistry. Laurie worked in Educational Support Services for several years, while studying for her Master of Public Health degree.

Last February, Laurie and her two cats moved to Khartoum, where she began her work, formed friendships with Sudanese, European and American aid workers, and began a study of Arabic language and culture. She has kept in contact with several friends in the School of Dentistry and the University, by vivid weekly e-mail messages.

When I heard about the bombing, I inquired about her safety, and sent her electronic "news clippings" from the Internet via e-mail. She responded within minutes, saying, "I just spoke to my guard. There will be more news on the radio in about five minutes. He speaks Arabic, so he may be able to tell me what is happening. Otherwise, you know more than I do. I'd appreciate your keeping me posted, and I'll do the same... I want to express my appreciation for all the prayers, messages, and concern aimed our direction. In God's care, Laurie."

The following is Laurie's account of her adventures since the bombing.

Laurie's story

It's six a.m. Wednesday [August 26], and I'm still in Khartoum. I had expected to be halfway to Nairobi by now. Instead, I'm going home to my cats and to my life, just slightly more appreciative of status quo. In a little over an hour I will be in the office. I hope for a productive day, although I'm sure I'll spend more time than usual greeting co-workers, most of whom have not seen me since Thursday last week. Some will expect I have gone away and come back.

Through one of the many co-workers who came to visit us during the day in the hospital with a dying friend, I sent word to my country director that I don't want to go, but if I have to, I will. My boss called his boss, and on up the chain, until late in the day I heard I could go home again — to my flat in Khartoum. I'm grateful, relieved, and disappointed. After several days of resigning myself to the fact that I had to leave, I had begun looking forward to spending time with friends in Nairobi. Since my travel documents are all in order, maybe I'll take my two-week R&R next month, after all. I think I could use the break.

Life hasn't quite been the same since the missiles landed on target last Thursday night, a short distance from the home of some friends. I didn't make it to market the next morning: during that day I was told I had to move in with another American family so we would all be in one place. Later I received word I would be evacuated to Nairobi on Sunday. I tried to be stoic, but spent part of the afternoon in tears anyway.

Deciding what to pack for a weekend at someone else's home occupied my mind somewhat. Cat health documents, passport, money, my jeans. Prioritizing what would comprise the 20 kilos allowed for luggage on my commercial flight to Kenya was a bit harder. I knew, however, I


wouldn't leave my cats behind.

I went to my temporary residence after dark Friday night. A friend had come to be with me during the last couple of hours I was at home. His presence was so reassuring that I realized being around other people would be constructive in a stressful time. A colleague came to pick me up and deliver me to my destination, just down the street from my own place.

I don't think that I have been afraid, particularly. Somewhat insecure, perhaps, because I've been quite willing to remain indoors. We made a couple of evening trips to the office to use the telephone for email and to collect items to help us continue with our work in our confinement. The TV news pictures and the BBC give a somewhat grim spin to events here. But everyone has reassured us that there are no problems. White people were wandering around the site of the destroyed building the day after the missile attack. "Demonstrators" waved as our local ADRA employee drove by. Although some said the people were angry at what they saw as an entirely uncalledfor, personal attack, nothing more than nasty words would be hurled our direction, they assured us. Black is not the color of the Sudanese heart.

I have experienced hostility because of my nationality and/or skin color before. But my experience in Sudan does not fit in with other experiences. Besides, extremists don't live on every corner. The people are different here.

So many have gone out of their way to make sure our needs are met, that we are



reassured, that we are not isolated. One of my friends spends two hours on public transportation to visit me Sabbath afternoon. She is Muslim, and performed her mid-day prayers while we began our sermon. Then she joined us. Together she and I have been seeing new pictures of God; we remind each other that He loves us and He is in charge. One of the images that has most impressed her is that we are in God's hand, and He is looking after us. She has since found that image in her own body of literature.

I think of my [Sudanese] colleagues who have been so generous with their time, willing for any task, quick with reassurance, inquiring after needs, cheerful, smiling, supportive. I see dark hands and light clasped. I see shared loyalty, concern, caring. I see love. They see me as a colleague, as a friend. My nationality and skin color make no difference to them. And I see now, more clearly, that in Christ there is no Jew or Greek, no Sudanese or American, no Adventist or Muslim. God sees us as people, not skin colors, attitudes, occupations, nationalities. God sees, and loves, us.

I spent a few hours at home last evening making final preparations in case I had to go, giving the cats some attention. When I got the phone call that determined that I would not leave, after all, I called the friends who lived close to the attack site.


Welcome home, one said. And I am.

Africa-Indian Ocean mission dental clinics visited by Dr. Crawford

There are four mission dental clinics in operation in this Division, with another one under development. James Crawford, SD'60, MPH, executive associate dean of the School of Dentistry, and General Conference of Seventh-day Adventists associate director of international dental affairs, visited Rwanda, Zaire (now called Republic of Congo), and Cameroon during the summer. He provided this report:

The clinic at Kinshasa, Zaire (#1 on map) is currently operated by Dr. Emilia Rosu, a graduate of the International Dentist Program at LLU School of Dentistry in 1991. She and her husband, Nick, have worked long and hard in this area. They have built a small church and a school next to the mission office compound, and have another school nearly built. The stress of the recent war which forced their evacuation in 1997, and the work of re-opening of the clinic has taken its toll on their energy. As of this writing, the conflict between Congo and Rwanda has escalated and expatriate personnel are being evacuated once again. Emilia and Nick will return to the U.S. and close this phase of their mission service. This has been a very successful dental clinic in the West Congo Union, and we pray that the political situation will soon be resolved so that we can once again provide dental ministry to this area of

last year, Dr. Ludy Piñeda, a dentist from the Philippines, has continued with the dental mission work there. The dental clinic is well recognized in the city and is doing very well. This clinic was constructed with thought and planning for a successful future. Howard Munson, SD'65, and his wife established this beautiful compound and clinic setting, and are thought of with high esteem in the area. During my visit, a graduate from the Philippines, Vincent Dionzon, was serving a volunteer assignment at this clinic.

The Yaounde SDA Clinic in Cameroon (#3 on map), is a very successful clinic in a very cordial atmosphere. The local personnel from Cameroon are very involved with the mission of the clinic and help to provide a strong relationship with the professional community. There are two Cameroonian dentists besides two graduates from LLU School of Dentistry, Dr. Perry Burtch and Dr. David Nielsen, both from the class of '89. Dr. Jean-Jacque Awoukeng is our most recent participant in the LLU six-month advanced training program, partially funded by NASDAD. Dr. Chantal Ngo-Bikoi is an excellent candidate for this program and her application is in process.

Equatorial Guinea (#4 on map): The French government has donated a large parcel of land and some funding on which to

build a dental clinic and school in Equatorial Guinea, just off the coast of the Cameroons. Dr. and Mrs. Burtch spent nearly their entire furlough soliciting donations of supplies and equipment for this clinic, and their container should arrive from the U.S. in October. The funds have not yet been voted by the Division or the General Conference to send a dentist for this new clinic. The Africa-Indian Ocean Division is responsible for six countries in this region, but have funding for only four health-related personnel for the entire area. Equatorial Guinea is an obvious need. New businesses are moving in from America and there are no health services currently available and practically no SDA presence there. The poverty of the island is miserable and the potential for Adventist health care is terrific. They need our prayers and support for this deserving project.

Madagascar Update (#5 on map): We have had a number of challenges in staffing the clinic at Madagascar. It is a fine facility, and has enjoyed a good reputation for quality dental care. We have a well-qualified volunteer in Bill Ingham, SD'58, a veteran mission dentist, who is willing to spend some time there to re- establish the practice. We are searching diligently for a long-term missionary to fill this very needy post.






International Dentist Program

• Ming-Way Lee, SD'86, associate professor of restorative dentistry in IDP, was one of six general practitioners who earned the Academy of General Dentistry's prestigious Mastership Award at a special ceremony held in Boston in

July. It is not an easy task to accomplish this, says the Academy. First, one must achieve fellowship status by completing 500 course hours within 10 years and then pass a written examination. The road to Mastership involves 600 additional hours, 400 of which must be earned by participating in hands-on courses sanctioned by the AGD. There are in excess of 100,000 dentists in the United States, and only about 1,400 have achieved Mastership status since they were first awarded in 1972.

• Ebenezer Johnson, BDS, SD'88, assistant professor of restorative dentistry in IDP, has been awarded a fellowship in the Academy of General Dentistry, at the July convocation of AGD. Dr. Johnson wrote an exam in 1991, then took more than 700 hours of continuing education in AGD-recognized courses.

ARTGLASS CROWN (CAP) STUDY

Clinical evaluation of Artglass for use in single fixed partial dentures

Study Criteria: The School of Dentistry is currently recruiting 100 adult subjects for a dental research study designed to test a new type of esthetic (appearance) crown (cap) for single teeth. The crown is made of a tooth-colored composite material, and is more natural looking in appearance than other types of crowns.



School of Dentistry top provider of CE - again

The School of Dentistry at Loma Linda University earned recognition as the top provider of continuing dental education in terms of courses offered and number of attendees, according to a survey by the Association of Continuing Dental Educators conducted among the 55 schools in the U.S. and Canada.

For the second consecutive year, LLUSD sponsored the most courses (164) and had the largest number of attendees (7,141). Close "competitors" were UCSF with 80 courses/ 6,200 attendees; and UNC/Chapel Hill had 43 courses/6,000 attendees. While other entities, such as dental societies and dental products companies also provide CE to dentists, dental schools are the largest providers.

The success of LLUSD in this area can be attributed to careful selection of high quality CE lecturers, which include both LLU faculty and invited faculty, convenient locations and attractive scheduling. The staff of LLUSD CE which is not as big as those in many other schools, has managed the program well and deserves the recognition earned.




