Sam Kim, SD'99, places first in ADA/Dentsply student table clinic competition

Sam Kim, SD'99, was first place winner with the table clinic. Comparative Analysis of Alternatives to Traditional Post and Core Systems on Severely Flared Canals of Endodontically Treated Teeth at the ADA/Dentsply Student Clinician Competition during the American Dental Association Annual Session in San Francisco, October 23-28, 1998.

Previously, Sam and his classmates Caroline Le and Dan Nguyen had placed first at the 1998 California Dental Association Spring Session in Anaheim, and second at the 1998 Alumni-Student Convention held on this campus in February. At the recent ADA meeting, Sam

participated in Category 1: Clinical Application and Technique, along with student representatives from 20 other dental schools. Only one member of each table clinic team is allowed to make the presentation and field questions.

As first place winner, Sam was an honored guest at the ADA banquet honoring the ADA president, and also received a travel prize to attend the midwinter meeting of the Chicago Dental Society.

Sponsoring the Loma Linda University entry was Douglass Roberts, SD'66, MS'77, professor of restorative dentistry. Also attending the ADA meeting was Fred Berry, DDS, associate professor of restorative dentistry and coordinator of the LLU Student Table Clinic Program.

Three other Loma Linda University School of Dentistry students have done well in this competition during the last few years. Vincent Chee, SD'92, placed first at the 1991 ADA Meeting in Seattle; James Henderson, SD'95, placed third at the 1994 ADA Meeting in New Orleans; and Franco Audia, SD'97, placed first at the 1996 ADA Meeting in Orlando.

Loma Linda University was recognized as being one of only 19 dental schools to have participated in each of the 40 competitions which have been sponsored by Dentsply International.

Congratulations to the team of Sam Kim, Caroline Le, and Dan Nguyen, on a job well done.

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















Students on the Move

Extramural trip to Argentina and Paraguay

On June 13, 1998, soon after my finals, I packed my winter clothes on a midsummer's day and was on my way to my Argentine mission trip. The six-hour flight from Los Angeles to New York took me from the dry heat of California to the hot humidity of the East Coast.

At JFK airport, I learned that a fire at a control tower in Argentina had delayed my flight. To make matters worse, one of my suitcases had been ripped open; and at the hotel where passengers were put up, I was given the key to a room that was already occupied by a naked man! Fortunately,



suitcase and I soon fell asleep -- it was 1:00 a.m. by this time. The next day, in very bad weather, I

noticed on landing was the chilly weather. However,

my friend, Gabriela, made me warmly welcome. I was very excited to see the land that I lived in ten years ago.

In Buenos Aires, I worked at the Clinica Belgrano Adventista with Dr. Rene Leichner and his wife, Dr. Edith Leichner. They were very friendly and patient with me although communication was often frustrating as we only spoke Spanish. My days at the clinic began at 9:00 a.m. and ended at 5:00 p.m. The patients were very friendly and understanding. They trusted my ability and many of them requested me for future treatment.

The facilitated clinic lacked many advanced dental materials and instruments.


Dr. Rene taught me how to utilize what we had to the best advantage. I watched him use a nail to make a cast post wax-up directly in a patient's mouth. It made me happy, therefore, to buy dental supplies for the clinic and to show Dr. Edith how to use some of the dental materials, such as composite fillings, polishing materials, and bleaching materials. I also demonstrated the use of these materials on some of the patients. It was a time of mutual learning.

During the third week of my mission trip, I had the unexpected opportunity to work for four days at the Sanatorio Adventista in Hohenau, Paraguay. I flew to Posada Mission (a northern province of Argentina) and was met by a staff member of the Sanatorio Adventista clinic. I did not expect any problems at the border, as Dr. Leichner had told me that I would not require a visa to enter Paraguay.

However, when we had driven ten minutes from the airport to the Parana Bridge that separates Argentina from Paraguay, a military officer holding a dangerous looking machine gun told me that I did not have proper documentation to enter Paraguay. Things did not look too good for me. Fortunately, an hour and a half later, an immigration officer whose son had been treated at the Adventist clinic, helped me enter Paraguay. He also promised to obtain the immigration documents I needed the next day.

Paraguay is very different from Argentina and much more like a "mission field." The roads of Hohenau are made of red mud and stones and called "tierra colorado" (colored earth). After walking in town for a day, my white socks turned the color of the red mud. The climate is more tropical during the winter. Green trees and bright tropical flowers added color to the scenery. There were only a few cars on the street, and once in a while I saw people riding mule-drawn carriages. Many ethnic groups, including Japanese, Brazilian and German, live in Hohenau. They are friendly and laid-back.

As the clinic, run by Dr. Anton, had only just been opened, I treated a small number of patients. Dr. Anton told me about the weekend clinics at "campo" (where many poor people live only ten kilometers away), where doctors and nurses provide free health and dental care. Unfortunately, I did not have the opportunity to visit "campo" while I was there.

When I returned to Argentina, the director, the immigration officer and the Sanatorio Adventista staff member, accompanied me. The immigration officer, who had not had the chance to get proper immigration documents for me, thought he could borrow the ambassador's car to drive me back to Argentina. Unfortunately, the ambassador was not home that day.

We were not stopped at the Paraguay border, but when we crossed to the Argentinian side, the border military officer asked for our identification. The three men accompanying me showed him their IDs and told him that I had to present my passport at the office. When we got to the office, another military officer told us to show him the trunk of the car and asked us if everything had been cleared with all the paperwork. The three men nodded in a cold sweat and the military officer waved us on through into Argentina. This was a miraculous answer to my prayers.

I was glad to return to the California sunshine on July 20. My first thoughts on stepping into the US were a realization that we have so much and are so blessed. I highly recommend that everyone do some kind of missionary work. You will personally experience God's power.

5. You want a real reason to have cable TV service.


4. You like to have a lake, mountain range, forest, and about 30,000 acres of space between you and the nearest grocery store.


Employee of the Quarter named



NASDAD holds annual session

The National Association of Seventh-day Adventist Dentists (NASDAD) held its 55th annual session this year in Pleasanton, California, October 21-25, 1998. Pleasanton is an interesting historic community about twenty miles southeast of Oakland; its nostalgic past has been dramatically overshadowed in recent years by commercial and residential development, not unlike Orange County in Southern California.

Presentations by the principal weekend speaker, Dr. Dan Smith, were enthusiastically received by the audience of more than 240 who attended this year's meetings. His theme was God's grace, with such intriguing titles as "I Am Not a Thief," "Just Grace," and "A Standing Ovation for Grace." Dr. Smith is the senior pastor of the La Sierra University SDA Church.

School of Dentistry faculty and staff members in attendance included Don Beglau, DDS; Barbara Bostwick; James Crawford, DDS; Charles Goodacre, DDS, MSD; William Heisler, DDS; Fred Kasischke, DMin; Robert Kinzer, DDS; Judson Klooster, DDS; William Seibly, DDS; Sharon Stirewalt; and Florence Wetmore.

Friday morning, John Peterson, SD'70, MS'78, presented a half-day continuing dental education course on the topic, "Behavior Management of the Child Dental Patient," tailoring his remarks to the audience comprising primarily general dentists. A golf tournament on Thursday, and a guided tour of Filoli Gardens on the San Francisco peninsula added to the interest of the convention for many of the participants.

The NASDAD Missions Committee studied proposals for financial

support of more than a dozen mission dental clinic projects in overseas locations; they recommended for approval the support of 11 projects with a projected cost total of nearly \$35,000. These projects were recommended to the NASDAD Board of Directors, and approved by that Board on Friday afternoon.

Support of dental mission projects is the central focus of NASDAD; it is realized in two principal ways: (1) *financial support*, such as that voted for this year's group of projects, is one key element of support, (2) *finding and recruiting dentists* for short and long-term service is another very important kind of support. NASDAD works very closely with Dr. James Crawford, secretary of dental affairs for the world headquarters of the SDA Church, in reporting to him the names of possible prospects who my be receptive to invitations for missions service.

One project of special interest to the School of Dentistry is the opportunity for dental students to be involved with NASDADsponsored projects in many world locations, broadening the emphasis on Service Learning that now is a growing part of our curriculum.

NASDAD has voted to support the Service Learning program with grants of \$10,000 per year for each of the next five years, in order to more closely involve our students in NASDAD-sponsored mission activities, and to make their participation less burdensome in terms of travel costs to distant locations.

NASDAD was organized in 1943 by a small group of SDA dentists who urgently believed that the Adventist world church should feature a School of Dentistry as a part of its educational system. The first eight years of NASDAD history were built around this theme, to persuade the Church leadership that such a School was an important part of the Church's mission and purpose. Our first dean, Dr. M. Webster Prince, was one of the founding members of NASDAD.

Once the School was established, this original sense of purpose had been satisfied, and the emphasis of NASDAD gradually shifted toward a principal theme of mission dentistry support. That concept had been a part of the reason for urging that an SDA-sponsored dental school be founded; once the School was a reality, mission support became NASDAD's principal reason for existence. Of course, the annual meetings do provide an important social venue for dentists and their families who share the vision of world service to get together, and frequently to meet colleagues who are already involved in mission service.

This year, for example, several mission dentist families were present; the privilege for the general membership of sharing the experience in conversational settings of these "front-liners" makes each annual session a very special event. Dr. Lude Piñeda from Rwanda, Dr. Karla Guerra, currently serving in Grenada and Dr. Sonja Newell-Smith from Jamaica, were examples of these in active service; numerous couples were present who have had past overseas service, and one or two who will soon leave for overseas assignments.

NASDAD is more than a "national" association— it has enthusiastic members in many countries who are in private practice or government service. Thus the overseas contingent of NASDAD membership is by no means limited to those who are in specific periods of mission assignment. Christian dentists of other church fellowships are sometimes involved in NASDAD's service programs, as well as students from this and other dental schools who share the Christian vision and mission service purpose, albeit not members of the SDA Church. From the words of the Master, "he who is not against us is on our side" (See Mark 9:38-41 NKJV for this story).

Those who attended this year's NASDAD meeting were delighted with the privileges of friendship and the various programs-- we all look forward with great enthusiasm to the 1999 annual session on Maui, in the beautiful setting of Hawaii.


