'Project Fix-it' team assists Davis Memorial Hospital in Guyana

From November 2 to 15 a group of individuals from the United States, Australia, and Scotland traveled to Davis Memorial Hospital in Georgetown, the capital of Guyana. They were there as part of Project Fix-it to upgrade the hospital's electrical system and to install two dental operatories.

The group was comprised of Richard Hart, MD, DrPH, chancellor, LLU; Robert Schoberth, AHS construction; Greg Batie, electrical engineer from Seattle; Kelvin Sawyer from Australia; Jim Redfield, special projects, School of Dentistry; Jairo Ayala, LLUMC construction & architectural services, and Kaaren Simpson, RN, Scotland.

Team members Todd Hooker, son of William Hooker, PhD, MFT, associate dean for student affairs, and Robert Nevis captured video footage which will be edited into an informational video about the project.

The Project Fix-it team was sent by Adventist Health International (AHI), an organization housed on the Loma Linda University campus.

Davis Memorial Hospital

Davis Memorial Hospital was established in 1954, nearly 12 years before Guyana gained independence from Britain. The country is one of the world's poorest nations, with per capita income less than one-fifth the South American average. It is one of approximately 50 mission hospitals operated by the Adventist Church that are experiencing severe financial and organizational challenges.

"When AHI began working with Davis Memorial," emphasizes Dr. Hart, "the hospital was not financially viable and had almost closed. It was suffering immense financial and management challenges. The hospital has 48 beds, but just five years ago only four to five beds were occupied."

School employees and students participate in disaster drill


A fire races through Prince Hall—hundreds of patients, students, faculty, and staff are unaware, working in dozens of offices on the School's five floors. A plan immediately goes into effect that will evacuate every one of the building's four stories and basement, and account for every individual in the School.

This was the scenario Friday, November 9, as the School participated in a University-wide disaster drill. Amazingly, the drill was completed and 342 persons throughout the School's 96,968 square feet were accounted for in 15 minutes.

During the drill exit monitors were stationed at each door, and individuals were directed to

Continued from page 1 to explore whether a dental clinic should be established at the hospital. He found that very few dental services were available in the area, and representatives from local dental laboratories emphasized the great need for

dental care.

The Adventist Church operates 76 dental clinics around the globe and Dr. Crawford not only served in Thailand directing a mission dental clinic, but also has been instrumental in establishing many of the other clinics.

"Wiring is very important to dentistry," informs Dr. Crawford. "And when I heard about Project Fix-it's rewiring project, I knew this would be the optimal time to design and build the dental operatories."

Dr. Crawford began to gather dental equipment and asked Mr. Redfield, retired from many years of service as director of dental maintenance and who now works for the School assisting with special projects, to design the dental clinic.

Mr. Redfield was thrilled to participate and drew up plans for two well-equipped operatories. Mr. Ayala would assist in the construction at the site.

"By the time the team arrived," says Dr. Crawford, "the hospital had followed the instructions we sent ahead—they had prepared the rooms and built and painted cabinets. The work was done to perfection."


The last pieces of equipment needed to finish installing the dental units arrived late the evening before the group was

scheduled to leave and so in order to complete the project, Mr. Redfield awakened before sunrise and began working at 4:30 a.m. The dental chairs were provided by Hank Estrada of Estrada Dental, based in Rancho Cucamonga. The company refurbishes dental equipment.

Dr. Crawford has been asked by the General Conference to find a dentist to staff the clinic, and a dentist now practicing in Zambia is scheduled to begin work in January, 2002.



Educational computing in dentistry competition call for entries

The Dental Informatics Section, American Dental Education Association (ADEA) is proud to sponsor the second Educational Computing in Dentistry competition. This project is intended to promote the development of high quality instructional software for dental health education through a competitive peer review process. There are three award categories: 1) World Wide Web Programs; 2) CD-ROM/DVD Programs; and 3) Support Programs. Each category carries three cash awards: first place \$1,000; second place \$500; and third place \$250. All entries will be reviewed in four areas of quality—pedagogy, subject matter, technical, and evaluation.

The three finalists will present their award winning projects during the Technology Fair on March 5, 2002. The awards will be announced and presented during the Annual Session. The Dental Informatics Section website will present highlights from each of the award winning programs. 

Continued from page 1 emergency assembly points (EAPs) outside Prince Hall.

"The fourth floor of Prince Hall," says Nancy Pulliam, dental disaster preparedness chair, "was safely evacuated and every person accounted for, in just three minutes." In a real emergency, this information would be given to the Red Cross so that family members could be given information about their loved ones.

Students and faculty who were treating patients in the School's clinics participated in the drill, and were given cards with details of the evacuation so they would be familiar with how to respond. The School also has plans for caring for patients who may have treatment in progress at the time of a disaster.

"We have prepared emergency first aid supplies," says Ms. Pulliam, "as well as equipment including protective goggles and crowbars that can be used to free individuals who may be trapped."

During each drill, staff practice with handheld walkie talkies, and there are also ham radio operators in the School who are prepared to assist in communications valuable because phone systems may be unusable when a disaster strikes.

The School is fortunate to have on its staff and faculty individuals who have served in the military and who have had training and experience in disaster preparedness. Ms. Pulliam received disaster response training with city employees in the Moreno Valley City Council room from FEMA (Federal Emergency Management Agency).
