Profile of the incoming classes by Sylvia Davis, MA, director of admissions

Editors note: The dental and dental hygiene classes starting school in September, 2003, begin their program 50 years after the first dental class began instruction in 1953. Following is an article by Sylvia Davis, MA, director of admissions, that profiles this landmark dental class.

Each year more than 130 students arrive at the School of Dentistry with excitement and passion to become dentists and dental hygienists. After evaluating and interviewing over 300 students, it is exciting also for the staff in the admissions office. The privilege of meeting and assisting each student in the process of applying is made rich by the various experiences they share and their excitement about their missions and goals.

In the United States through the American Association of Dental Schools Admissions Service, 4,000 applicants applied for admission and selection by schools across the country. LLUSD received 1,234 applications.

Ninety new students arrived for orienta-

tion along with three returning students and two who transferred from another School in the University. There are 57 men and 38 women in this class, coming from more than 24 colleges and universities. Twenty-three students received predental education at La Sierra University.

Included in the class are two dental hygienists, one physical therapist, one respiratory therapist, and five clinical medical scientists.

Coming from nine countries, 21 in the class are international students. In this year's class, there are four African-American students, four Hispanic students, and 43 students with an Asian heritage.

In the class there are 75 students who are Seventh-day Adventists, with 15 students who are also Christian and represent a number of Christian denominations.

The School is very proud of the alumni who leave our campus and continue to show support by encouraging their sons and daughters to apply to their School. In the next issue we will list names of those from the class along with their relatives who are alumni.

Other alumni have chosen to teach an Introduction to Dentistry course in a college or university near their practices. Darleen Hemmerlin, SD'72, has taught this course at Pacific Union College in Angwin, California; Donald Kellogg, SD'72 and David Hernandez, SD'75, are teaching this class at Walla Walla College, Walla Walla, Washington. The introductory course at La Sierra University has been taught


by several alumni, including Eugene Rathbun, SD'65, MS'71, who, with his daughter, Shelly Rathbun-Nordman, SD'92, MS'95, were the first to offer this class. Duane Wacker, SD'64, and his son, Chris Wacker, SD'95, PG'97, teamed up to teach the course followed by Muna Soltan, SD'74, current instructor. At Southern Adventist University, Patrick Im, SD'94, teaches a similar course, as does Dr. Frank Cochlin at Andrews University.

At each Adventist college and university there are alumni who open their offices to give the pre-dental students in their area a chance to volunteer or shadow them. LLUSD alumni often volunteer to give a current applicant an understanding of the dental profession by inviting the student to visit their private practice, as well as LLUSD.

Remembering Alden Chase July 2, 1925-September 2, 2003

Alden Chase was born July 2, 1925, in Denver, Colorado, and was raised in Tulsa, Oklahoma where his parents owned Chase Potato Chip Company.

He earned a bachelor's degree at Union College in Lincoln, Nebraska, and married Earlene Stroud in 1946.

Dr. Chase served as a medic in the U.S. Army for two years, working on hospital ships traveling between California and the Philippines. After his military service was complete, he earned a BS degree in medical technology from Loma Linda University in 1950.

He later attended the School of Dentistry, receiving his DDS degree in 1960. He then entered the School's orthodontics and dentofacial orthopedics program. After completing the program and receiving his MS degree in 1963, he joined the faculty and served for more than four decades as teacher, administrator, and twice as department chair. He served as Alumni Association president in 1969.

He was named emeritus professor in 1997. In addition to his many years of service to the School, Dr. Chase was a member of the University's Board of Trustees from 1990 to 2000, and served with distinction on the Board's executive committee.

Not only has Dr. Chase taught and practiced orthodontics locally, but he also served in Thailand, Africa, the Marshall Islands, and Mexico, teaching and relieving missionary dentists for short periods of time. For many years, he flew his own plane about once a month to the Navajo Indian Reservation in Monument Valley.

In his spare time Dr. Chase enjoyed traveling with his wife, Earlene. They traveled around the world in 1977 visiting countries in Europe, and stopping in Fiji and Australia, on their journey.

Dr. Chase was a skilled gardener and roses from his garden often were displayed in his office.

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20th Annual Review of Endodontic Biology course held September 21–22

For twenty years, the endodontic faculty has presented an annual two-day review course on the biological aspects of endodontic diagnosis, treatment, and outcome assessment. This year the course, which attracts about 100 participants every year, was held September 21 and 22 at the Hilton Hotel in San Bernardino.

While the review course was originally planned and designed for candidates preparing for the certification examinations of the American Board of Endodontics (ABE), it has also become popular with other dentists including endodontic specialists, who enjoy being updated on the basis for practicing this discipline of dentistry.

The faculty for the review consists of School of Dentistry faculty along with invited presenters; this year the School was represented by Drs. Charles Goodacre, Steve Morrow, James Simon (who has faculty appointments at both LLU and USC), and Lane Thomsen.

The invited speakers were Dr. Shimon Friedman from the University of Toronto,

Canada, and Dr. Ashraf Fouad from the University of Connecticut. Also, participating was Dr. Keith Krell from the University of Iowa—he represented the ABE and gave Board candidates and the endodontic residents from the four Southern California endodontic programs (LLU, USC, UCLA, and Long Beach VA) an update on the certification process and helpful hints about how to prepare for the examination.

Planning and presenting these types of courses are time consuming and require considerable effort, but it has been worth it for these many years, according to Leif K. Bakland, SD'63, professor and chair of endodontics, who, along with Dr. Simon, began these programs and has been involved with them since the beginning.

"It is always nice," says Dr. Bakland, "to have a colleague come up during a meeting to tell you how much these review courses helped in preparing for the ABE boards."





During the quarterly break I visited Dr. Ralph Steinman, professor emeritus, who was LLUSD's sole researcher (and author of more than 87 papers) for nearly 30 years. The occasion of this trip by personal plane to Sunny Valley, Oregon, was to obtain more information and published materials for a research review about dentinal fluid transfer.


Flight the next day was extended up the rugged, pristine western coastline of British Columbia to visit Dr. Tim Sanders who has lived and practiced in Ketchikan, Alaska, for many years. Due to the topography of the area, the airport's runway lies across a narrow strait from the city of Ketchikan and must be traversed via ferry.

Dr. Sanders has several satellite practices which he has maintained in southeast Alaska over many years.

One practice, started in Craig, Alaska, on Prince of Wales Island, is now owned by and shared with Dr. Scott Brookshire. It was my privilege to observe this office. Transportation to this remote location out of Ketchikan is either by three-hour inter-island ferry or 45minute float plane ride.

It certainly is a tribute to our former graduates who have devoted their lives to practicing the quality of dentistry taught at LLUSD under diverse circumstances in off-the-beatenpath localities, serving local islanders who would have to travel inconvenient distances or forgo dental care altogether.

Innovators such Drs. Steinman, Sanders, and Brookshire might sometimes cause others of us to re-assess our life's priorities and goals.




