## Technology in Education workshop

The Faculty Development Committee hosted a two-day Technology in Education workshop over President's Day weekend, with more than 80 faculty choosing to attend.

Included in the program was a charge from Richard Hart, LLU Chancellor, to use technology to further the values of the School of Dentistry and continue to develop community for our students and faculty.

Charles J. Goodacre, SD'71, MSD, dean, presented an overview of electronic material development in the School, as well as his vision for the future in creating meaningful, just-in-time learning. Says Dr. Goodacre, "My hope is that the faculty will continue to develop material that conveys our motto and vision, as well as provide high-quality clinical learning opportunities for our students."

Brent Dove, DDS, from the University of Texas Health Science Center in San Antonio shared with the faculty the experiences of his school in implementing a curriculum that is now completely electronic.

Dr. Dove also presented information on digital radiography, including tips on how to move from a film-based system to a digital system. "Dr. Dove's presentation validated our processes here at Loma Linda, as we're on the same track as San Antonio in planning, developing, and implementing the electronic patient record," says Paul Richardson, SD'72, associate dean for clini-

cal administration. "The meeting was valuable for both administrators and faculty, as it is part of a strategic long-term plan to incorporate many of these concepts into our clinical and academic processes."

Representatives from SensAble brought their virtual reality system and allowed the faculty to experiment by "carving" into a plaster box, and PhotoMed brought digital cameras for use in a clinical workshop. Doyle Nick, SD'78, assistant professor, restorative dentistry and chair, Faculty Development Committee, stated the "program fulfilled the goal of exposing the faculty to electronic possibilities and inspiring them on to a new level of interest in different forms of teaching and learning."

Jim Dunn, SD'69, associate professor, restorative dentistry, directed the digital dental photography workshop, and was pivotal in getting PhotoMed to donate a Canon G5 Intraoral system valued at \$1,800. This system was given as a door prize, with Kathleen Moore, MHIS, assistant dean for educational support services, winning the system. "I'm really excited about winning this camera! Richard Tinker, director, educational support services and Richard Cross, dental school photographer, now have another high-end tool to use as they produce material for the faculty."

The next faculty development program will be a Wholeness Retreat at Camp Cedar





A single parent, she is dedicated to providing a Christ-centered home for her family.





#### Katherine Whitman Stromberg-Vining, 1916–2004

Katherine Whitman Stromberg-Vining, widow of Dr. Ross W. Stromberg, the School's first assistant dean, passed away January 28 in Collegedale, Tennessee. She was laid to rest in Lexington, Kentucky, February 3, by Dr. Stromberg's side.

Dr. Stromberg was a charter member of National Association of Seventh-day Adventist Dentists and was one of the administrators who planned the School's curriculum and building, Mrs. Stromberg-Vining provided the authors of the School's 50th Anniversary Book with an evewitness account of the School's early history.

She is survived by husband, Noble B. Vining; daughter Elizabeth Williams; stepdaughter Judith Campbell; stepson David Vining; 8 grandchildren; and 4 great grandchildren.
