### THE TESTAMENT OF FREEDOM

The Testament of Freedom was composed in honor of the two hundredth anniversary of the birth of Thomas Jefferson and was first performed April 13, 1943, at the University of Virginia. The texts of this work are from the following writings of Jefferson: I, A Summary View of the Rights of British America (1774); II and III, Declaration of Causes and Necessity of Taking up Arms (July 6, 1775); IV, Letter to John Adams (1821).

I. The God who gave us life gave us liberty at the same time; the hand of force may destroy but cannot disjoin them.

II. We have counted the cost of this contest, and find nothing so dreadful as voluntary slavery. Honor, justice, and humanity forbid us tamely to surrender that freedom which we received from our gallant ancestors, and which our innocent posterity have a right to receive from us. We cannot endure the infamy and guilt of resigning succeeding generations to that wretchedness which inevitably awaits them if we basely entail hereditary bondage upon them.

Our cause is just. Our union is perfect. Our internal resources are great.... We gratefully acknowledge, as signal instances of the Divine favor towards us, that His Providence would not permit us to be called into this severe controversy until we were grown up to our present strength, had been previously exercised in warlike operation, and possessed of the means of defending ourselves. With hearts fortified with these animating reflections, we most solemnly, before God and the world, declare that, exerting the utmost energy of those powers which our beneficent Creator hath graciously bestowed upon us, the arms we have been compelled by our enemies to assume we will, in defiance of every hazard, with unabating firmness and perseverance, employ for the preservation of our liberties; being with one mind resolved to die freemen rather than to live slaves.

III. We fight not for glory or for conquest. We exhibit to mankind the remarkable spectacle of a people attacked by unprovoked enemies, without any imputation or even suspicion of offense. They boast of their privileges and civilization, and yet proffer no milder conditions than servitude or death.

In our native land, in defense of the freedom that is our birthright and which we ever enjoyed till the late violation of it; for the protection of our property, acquired solely by the honest industry of our foretathers and ourselves; against violence actually offered; we have taken up arms. We shall lay them down when hostilities shall cease on the part of the aggressors and all danger of their being renewed shall be removed, and not before.

IV. I shall not die without a hope that light and liberty are on steady advance.... And even should the cloud of barbarism and despotism again obscure the science and liberties of Europe, this country remains to preserve and restore light and liberty to them.... The flames kindled on the 4th of July, 1776, have spread over too much of the globe to be extinguished by the feeble engines of despotism; on the contrary, they will consume these engines and all who work them.

### ACADEMIC COSTUMES

ACADEMIC CAPS AND GOWNS worn at commencement ceremonies in the United States evolved from the traditional everyday garb of the undergraduate student of earlier centuries in Europe and England. Most American colleges now subscribe to an intercollegiate system of academic costume established in 1894 to standardize gowns and hoods for the three titles conferred: bachelor, the first academic degree, conferred on completion of a college curriculum, originally the title used to designate the apprentice as compared to the master workman or craftsman; master, an advanced academic degree, originally the title applied to the skilled craftsman admitted by his superiors to begin teaching (hence the word "commencement"); doctor, the highest academic degree conferred, originally a title implying that its possessor was so well versed in a branch of knowledge or a profession as to be qualified to teach.

CAP. The standard black cap (the so-called mortarboard, derived from the cap of Oxford University) is worn both indoors and outdoors with academic costume. The tassel, fastened to the middle of the top and usually worn at the left front, may be black or gold or may correspond to the color of the velvet trim symbolic of the branch of learning. Candidates for the bachelor's and the master's degrees at this College wear the black tassel, and candidates for the doctor's degree wear the gold. Faculty members wearing caps unlike the mortarboard hold degrees from universities outside the United States of America and are costumed in a manner distinctive of those universities.

GOWN. The usual color for the gown is black. The gown of the bachelor or the master is untrimmed; that of the doctor is trimmed with a wide velvet band on either side at the front and with three narrow velvet bands across the upper portion of the sleeve. The velvet bands may be black or may be the color distinctive of the branch of learning. The distinguishing feature of the gown is the sleeve, which is designed to indicate the degree of the wearer: bachelor, long, open, and pointed, extending below the hip; master, long and narrow, slit at the elbow to expose the forearm, the end square and closed, extending below the knee; doctor, voluminous, bell-shaped, extending to the wrist.

HOOD. The most colorful and distinctive item of the costume is the hood, which passes around the neck and extends down the back. The hood is lined with the official colors of the college conferring the degree, and these colors appear where the hood turns outward at the center back. The bands of velvet on either side of the center turn-back indicate the branch of learning. Details in the style of the hood indicate the degree: bachelor, three feet long, pointed, two-inch velvet band; master, three and a half feet long, pointed, three-inch velvet band; doctor, four feet long, paneled at the sides to give a rounded appearance at the lower edge, five-inch velvet band.

COLORS. A purple chevron on a field of gold identifies the hoods of candidates and graduates of the College of Medical Evangelists. Some of the hood colors seen in the Faculty procession identify graduates of the following universities:

California, yale blue on gold Chicago, maroon George Washington, buff on dark blue Harvard, crimson Illinois, orange on navy blue Northwestern, purple Ohio State, silver on scarlet Columbia, white on light blue Emory, gold on navy blue Oregon, dark green on lemon Southern California, cardinal on gold Washington (state), purple on gold Wisconsin, cardinal

Colors associated with the branches of learning (shown by means of the velvet trimming on hoods and in some cases on the front and sleeves of the gown) are: dentistry, lilac; education, light blue; law, purple; liberal arts, white; library science, lemon; medicine, green; nursing, apricot; pharmacy, olive; philosophy, dark blue; public health, salmon; science, gold yellow; social work, citron; theology, scarlet.

A Fellow of the American College of Surgeons is identified by a navy blue gown with scarlet velvet trimming. A Fellow of the American College of Dentistry is identified by the trimming of the basic doctor's academic gown, the velvet trimming being the red of the American rose bordered with lilac.


