A graduate of Pacific Union College (B.A. 1948) and Loma Linda University (M.D. 1952), Dr. Weaver became a Diplomate of the American Board of Surgery in 1960 and a Fellow of the American College of Surgeons in 1969. He has held positions in clinical supervision and administration since 1961. His medical career began with the private practice of surgery (Pontiac, Michigan 1958-61). He served as chief of surgery at the Karachi Seventh-day Adventist Hospital (Karachi, Pakistan 1961-66); and later as staff surgeon, chief of surgical service, and chief of the head and neck section of surgical service at the Veterans Administration Medical Center in Allen Park, Michigan (1966-present). He joined the faculty of Wayne State University School of Medicine in 1967, becoming associate professor of surgery in 1971, and was chairman of the Dean's Committee Task Force (1972-75). During the past ten years Dr. Weaver has voluntarily organized and conducted more than 300 Stop Smoking Clinics. It is estimated that as many as 75,000 people have stopped smoking through the encouragement of programs with which he has been associated. He is the author of numerous articles; recipient of many awards; and active in professional, religious, and civic affairs.

THE MACE. Traditionally the ceremonial mace represents the authority vested in the highest officer of a governing body. In an educational institution, the authority symbolized by the mace derives from respect for the authority of knowledge and for the rights and value of the individual. Thus, the leader of an academic community assumes the obligation and challenge to ensure for its members a climate conducive to growth in knowledge and grace.

The construction of the ceremonial mace of Loma Linda University evokes further ideas. Its two metals, bronze and aluminum, suggest the value of lessons both ancient and contemporary. Rather than lying prone, an instrument to be wielded, this mace stands upright in celebration of the free human spirit. Its open construction implies free exposure to questions, ideas, and conflict. The eight vertical supporting elements (at three points bound together as for strength and stability in unity) uphold a graceful oval that points outward to the universe, the province of inquiry.

Within the oval, the University seal appears to float unfettered. The caduceus on the left represents all fields of the healing arts and sciences. The broken sword on the right implies mercy in the sense of selflessness and restraint from acts and attitudes of self-aggrandizement and destructiveness. The open book suggests God the Word as the basis for all truth. The lighted torch symbolizes the illuminating power of knowledge and the University's central purpose of forwarding and perpetuating good through the enlightened, searching, caring mind and conscience of the individual.

I begin once more my daily work. Be thou with me, Almighty Father of Mercy, in all my efforts to heal the sick. For without thee, man is but a helpless creature. Grant that I may be filled with love for my art and for my fellowmen. May the thirst for gain and the desire for fame be far from my heart. For these are the enemies of Pity and the ministers of Hate. Grant that I may be able to devote myself, body and soul, to thy children who suffer from pain.

Preserve my strength, that I may be able to restore the strength of the rich and the poor, the good and the bad, the friend and the foe. Let me see in the sufferer the man alone. When wiser men teach me, let me be humble to learn; for the mind of man is so puny and the art of healing is so vast. But when fools are ready to advise me or to find fault with me, let me not listen to their folly. Let me be intent upon one thing, O Father of Mercy, to be always merciful to thy suffering children.

May there never rise in me the notion that I know enough, but give me strength and leisure and zeal to enlarge my knowledge. Our work is great and the mind of man presses forward forever. Thou hast chosen me in thy grace to watch over the life and death of thy creatures. I am about to fulfill my duties. Guide me in this immense work so that it may be of avail.
