Record-setting number of students apply to School of Dentistry

A record-setting year for applicants, 2006 brought precisely 2,006 applicants to Loma Linda University School of Dentistry. For the class of 93 students, admissions officers interviewed approximately 400 applicants and spent 40 to 50 hours examining applications from promising candidates. Fred Kasischke, DMin, associate dean, admissions, says that in a nutshell dentistry requires a love of science and love of working with your hands. In addition, to be congruent with the mission of the school, admissions officers look for service-oriented extracurriculars-tutoring, community involvement, altruistic activities.

"This doesn't guarantee a commitment," he says, "but we know the students have been exposed to the challenge of the underserved community. Our motto—service is our calling—makes our school distinct.

Dr. Kasischke cites the role of dental alumni as significant in preparation of candidates, who perform a minimum of 20 hours of shadowing in a dental office. Alumni share memories of dental school, things they wish they had done, what they enjoyed most. A score or more of dentists are also involved in predental clubs and classes at feeder institutions.

During the graduation banquet, music was provided by Sweet Silver, a flute quartet ensemble.






Dr. Mead was installed as president during the annual California Dental Association House of Delegates meeting November 10 to 12, in Beverly Hills, California.

Building a strong and meaningful relationship

Some of the ways that a couple can implement changes in their relationship lies within their communication. The following communication tips given can be useful to all relationships, as well as romantic ones.

Tip 1: Realize that your partner is different from you

A person chooses a partner because of who he or she is—not because they are alike. Joy in the relationship comes from allowing the person to be who they are. Try to celebrate those differences!

Tip 2: Say exactly what you mean

Avoid generalities and realize that your partner may not be hearing what you think you are saying. The mirroring technique allows you and your partner to repeat what you heard the other person say in order to see if it fits with what was intended.

Tip 3: Tell your partner how you feel and what you think

Speaking precisely is important and it teaches the difference between feelings and thinking. They are important but different. Feelings fall under the categories of mad, sad, glad, and fearful. Instead of saying "I feel you are not listening," you could say "I think you are not listening" and "I feel angry when I sense you are not listening."

Tip 4: Use active listening

Make eye contact with your partner, repeat what he or she said and see if there is more, and avoid disputing things you don't agree with in that particular conversation.

Tip 5: Use "I" statements rather than "You" statements

Everyone has a right to his or her feelings, but no one else is responsible for them. When things go badly, a person is more likely to say something that causes the other person to have negative thoughts, which can lead to emotional

reactions.

When an "I" statement is used, it implies vulnerability and minimizes the chances of the statement being critical and blaming. For example, "you irritate me" vs. "I feel irritable." "You are a slob" vs. "I don't like picking up after you." Follow the "I" phrase with "because" or "when." "You" statements usually result in defensive reactions.

Tip 6: Make requests, not demands

If it is a request, then any answer is acceptable. True requests obligate no one. Requests maintain the other's dignity.

Tip 7: Reply rather than react to your partner

Instead of reacting automatically to what the partner says, talk with him or her and see if the reactions are appropriate. You will better know what kind of reply will be best. The goal is to preserve your partner's dignity while making your true position known. Remember, nonverbal reactions are even more powerful than verbal!

Tip 8: Emotions are never wrong

Practice using better and more precise words for emotions and be aware that you may not want to tell your true feelings. Our family of origin probably didn't want us to always talk of our feelings, so we learned not to express them openly.

Tip 9: Validate your mate's feelings rather than trying to fix them

The job is not to solve the problem, but rather to listen. That is usually all your partner wanted anyway.

Tip 10: Listen to the real appeal behind the words

When your partner is yelling and upset, you are being asked to listen and understand. Instead of getting defensive, try pleasing your mate, assuming that in the message is a "please." Beneath every argument is a frustrated desire for something. See if you can find what it is.

Tip 11: Be honest

Risk being a fool to tell your feelings and ask to find out what theirs really are. Most arguments are about one person thinking the other meant something completely different.

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Instead of reacting immediately, take the time to look at your partner's reaction and learn to empathize with him or her. Remember, if your partner seems to overreact, the energy is really about something else.

Tip 13: Use lightness of spirit and humor A good self-deprecating twist always

A good self-deprecating twist always helps.

Tip 14: Plan time for fun together

It is easy to be bogged down with business. Surprising your partner with something designed to please them increases the possibility of togetherness.

The bottom line of communication theory is that when we get out of ourselves and try to align with the other's world and needs, we always know better what to say or do. It is a lesson of life that we get in our own way when we try too hard. Get out of the way and listen and give. It works!
