## Susan Roche co-authors chapter in major textbook



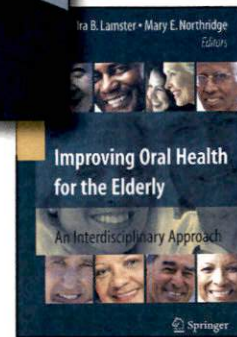

Dr. Susan Roche, associate professor, co-authored a textbook chapter with Dr. Ali Makki titled "Orofacial Pain and Neurological Disorders Affecting the Head and Neck," in I.B. Lamster & M.E. Northridge (Eds), *Improving Oral Health for the Elderly: An Interdisciplinary Approach*.

The chapter focuses on musculoskeletal conditions, temporomandibular joint disorders, headaches and neuropathic pain disorders affecting the elderly patient. This information, can be insightful for practitioners who have patients presenting with gingival pain, toothache, or facial pain with no clear dental etiology. Identifying the source of referred pain can present a challenge and often results in misdiagnosis, needless patient suffering, and unnecessary dental treatment. This material will be invaluable in formulating differential diagnoses for facial pain.



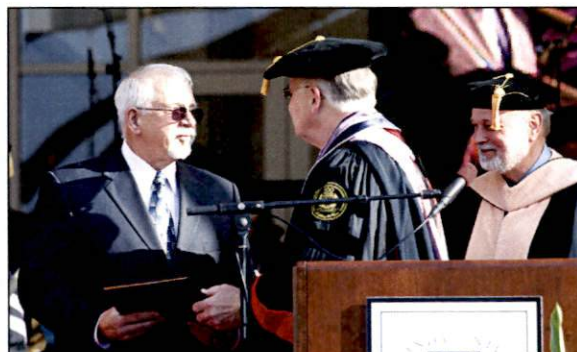

## New equipment available for faculty use

The Center for Dental Research has recently acquired a PAXcam Digital Microscope camera, the PAXcam2+, with the PAXit! image management and analysis software for the Olympus Light Microscope and Inverted Microscope. The CCD sensor in the PAXcam2+ has the inherent ability to capture low-light images, and it also features an enhanced dynamic range that translates to more accurate color rendition and tonal qualities in captured images.
